E. J. Leinen Solemn Mass

Solemn Requiem Mass for Edward J. Leinen, choir director at three churches and who sang at weddings and funerals in virtually every Catholic church in Rochester was offered in St. Ambrose Tuesday, Sept. 13.

Dr. Leinen, 74, of 3936 St. Paul Blvd., active in music in Rochester for more than half a century and who operated the Winton Liquor Store, 661 Winton Rd. N. died Sept. 10, 1939.

THE MASS WAS celebrated by the Rev. Joseph W. Doherty, pastor of St. John's Church, St. Ambrose, and the Rev. Francis R. Davis, subdeacon. Also in the sanctuary were the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Thomas F. Connor, the Rt. Rev. Richard K. Buxus, the Rt. Rev. Frank W. Mason and the Reverend Father W. William Gordinier and Robert J. Donovan.

Dr. Leinen was choir director of St. Ambrose Church before he was taken ill a year ago. Earlier he was director of the choirs of Blessed Sacrament Church and St. John the Evangelist Church, Humboldt St.

He was choir director at St. John the Evangelist Church from 1915 to 1925, having become an agent for New York Life Insurance Co. In 1928 he formed the 24-voice male choir in Blessed Sacrament Church at the request of Monsignor Connor's pastor. He headed it for several years.

He had operated the liquor store, owned by his wife, the former Colette Mock, since 1941.

Besides directing choirs, Mr. Leinen had performed as a violinist, orchestra leader and singer since 1906.

Mrs. LEINEN joined the Rochester Symphony Orchestra as a violinist in 1905 and a year later formed his own orchestra of colleagues in that orchestra. The group played for concerts, amateur theater groups and dances. He headed it three years.

Dr. Leinen also was interested in acting and in 1925 joined the Rochester Community Players, taking prominent parts in many productions. In 1938, he organized and directed the first orchestra to perform at the Community Players Playhouse, for the production, "Under the Spellings."

Dr. Leinen was a native of Rochester. Besides his wife, he leaves a son, Richard E.; two daughters, Mrs. Allen Cappy and Mrs. Howard Rupert of Houston; four grandchildren; a brother, Alphonse P.; several nieces and nephews.
