British Workers Fight Red Trend

London — (NC) — An underground movement of small, picked groups of Catholic trade unionists is "fighting" the communists on their own terms inside British industry.

Enlisting the aid of reliable factory workers and dropping the "Catholic label" in their work, the movement has adopted many of the communists' own tactics in smashing rabble-rousing activities.

According to the Catholic Herald, nationally circulated weekly newspaper, the "fighting" campaign is an anonymous parish priest called "Father Pipeline."

The anonymous priest outlined a series of principles to guide the campaign. Through the Herald, he asked other priests to follow his example. HE TOLD the clergymen to study and know the social encyclicals, learn the principles

of trade unionism and keep abreast of the social conditions in the local factories by speaking to parishioners.

The anonymous priest said each clergyman should pick his "top ten" men, not necessarily Catholics, who have a full understanding of communist tactics. The ten should be "travelers" in the plant, men whose jobs take them from department to department, where they can learn what is going on and take appropriate action.

"Father Pipeline" told the Catholic Herald that Communists have only one aim: to disrupt things in the shop if they do not get what they want.

He suggested that industrial parishes open training centers for factory workers with perhaps evening classes daily for one year.

Admitting that the Catholic Social Guild and the Association of Catholic Trade Unionists have very important roles to play, the priest said that "pipelines should be laid first on the factory floor into which information can be piped down from Catholic Social Guild levels through the priest guiding the operation."

"Father Pipeline" added some "don'ts" for the clergy: "Don't talk encyclicals" to the masses. They know what you tell them most have the Church's backing because you are a priest.

"Don't order them back to work when they strike. The decision is theirs.

"Don't talk Catholic Action to them, just base your remarks on common sense.

"Don't stick a Catholic label on them."

In addition to the above courses, the Center offers a Basic Study and Reading Skills Course and a course in Basic Mathematics Skills and Problem Solving for all high school and college students and adults.

The Director, Mrs. Alice Deas Comerford, A.B., M. Ed., stressed the Center's function to assist students in further development of the basic tools of learning essential for more efficient learning.
