

Rosary Intentions For October

World Peace ★ Nov. Elections ★ New Schools

Catholics of the Diocese have been called by their Bishop to make October, traditional month of the Holy Rosary, a time of urgent prayer for three special intentions.

Bishop Kearney made his appeal for the month long prayers because of the "world situation and world peace, the important election in November and our high school program."

"For all these we need our Lady's help," the Bishop said.

He will begin the prayer crusade during tomorrow evening's Family Rosary for Peace radio broadcast on WSYA at 7 p.m.

During the rest of the month students of Rochester's Catholic high schools will lead the nightly Rosary recitation.

Families of the Diocese are urged to join in the prayers in their homes each evening.

The Bishop will again take over the microphone on Sunday, October 30, to close the Sacred Heart Year, observed throughout the Diocese during 1960, by consecrating homes to the Sacred Heart of the Saviour.



That date is the Church's feast of Christ the King.

Bishop Kearney will celebrate solemn Mass at Sacred Heart Cathedral and all parish churches will also have a special Mass on the afternoon of the feast to consecrate the Diocese and each parish in honor of our Lord's Sacred Heart.

The Bishop's three intentions for Rosary month parishes are current headline items — world peace, threatened by the deepening rift between Communist and free world nations; the nation-wide elections in November to determine America's chief executive in the critical years ahead, and the four million dollar fund drive to build two new Catholic high schools in Monroe County.

He has scheduled a representative from each of the Rochester area Catholic high schools to lead recitation of the Rosary as follows: Sundays, St. Andrew's Seminary; Mondays, Nazareth Academy; Tuesdays, Aquinas Institute; Wednesdays, Our Lady of Mercy High School; Thursdays, McQuaid Jesuit High School; Fridays, Sacred Heart Academy, and Saturdays, St. Agnes High School.

Florida Schools Head Deplores Religion Ban

Miami — (RNS) — Florida State School Superintendent Thomas D. Bailey said here that if education is to reflect the community in which people live and prepare children for adulthood "religion and the moral and spiritual values which are a part of religion must not and cannot be ignored in our schools."

Mr. Bailey's remarks appeared in an article in the Florida School Bulletin in the midst of an all-out legal attack on religious observances in Florida.

Mr. Bailey wrote: "It will be a sad day in America if a legal concept of separation of Church and State ever denies children and youth in public schools the fundamental right to know about religions, the moral and spiritual values necessary for the formation of character, and non-sectarian reading of the Bible.

Eisenhower Says

Charity Work Sets Example To Nation

New York — President Eisenhower said America's Catholic Charities organizations are an inspiring example of "selfless service" to the nation and to the world.

This, he said, is "your greatest contribution" — of even greater value than the Church's "priceless institutions to help the needy, to relieve suffering to heal the sick."

The Chief Executive addressed the 50th anniversary dinner of the National Conference of Catholic Charities.

He stressed that a "great bulwark against collapse into materialism and utter dependence on the omnipotent State" is voluntary private giving by individuals and groups for charitable causes.

A materialistic America "has lost its spiritual purpose," he warned, "could be nothing more than a rudderless ship of state," and eventually a victim of the fury of international storms and internal decay."

Speaking before a capacity audience of some 2,500 church, civic and business leaders, and other guests, the President said: "I salute the devotion and the individual example that spiritual base of our society ever become dimmed, our faith in God, the destiny of America would disappear before a vast alliance of materialism and crass political maneuvering."

"For close to two centuries," he said, "our nation has thrived under the guiding influence of the Chief Executive, the strength and the dignity of the individual, the example of the individual, the example of the spiritual base of our society ever become dimmed, our faith in God, the destiny of America would disappear before a vast alliance of materialism and crass political maneuvering."

The Chief Executive told the guests that this country will "steadily maintain its military, moral, economic and political strength to insure its safety against the dangers inherent in the attitude and announced purposes of powerful, secretive dictatorship."

"Further," he continued, "knowing that peace and freedom are weakened if not shared, we help other nations which like ourselves, uphold the dignity of men and maintain their freedom. But in spite of these inseparable bonds, America, my heart is still broken, for if true to herself, will never fail to entice members of her family to be tempted to abandon her noble goals."

Stated with the President at "To you, President Eisenhower, the twofold duty were four cardinal," the Cardinal said. "I am afraid and more than 65 archbishops and great prelates, bishops and priests, as well as I have held, have held, in my heart as federal, state and local politicians since the time when first the eminent officials including Governor in North Africa, such as Nelson Rockefeller and Major General George Robert F. Wagner, was the grave responsibility for the protection of America and the God-given liberty of a prayerful multitude that has endured throughout the years as you compiled with the trusting will of the American people, and accepted the tremendous burden of the office of President."

President Eisenhower's address was interrupted several times by applause. He received a standing ovation at the start and conclusion of his talk.

Noting that Americans will give more than \$6,000,000 for philanthropic causes in 1960, the President said that money for charity raised by taxes "is given though willingly paid, can serve us all."
