He is Brother Dilemas Hargness of Houston, Tex., who often logs 1,500 miles during a single, month-long journey. Making his job treacherous are deadly schools of small fish in the river that can rip the flesh from a human body in just a few minutes.

Religion To Be 'Caught'
Sherman Oaks — (NC) — Religion is not only "taught" but "caught" as well from the atmosphere in a Catholic home, a Christian Family Movement convention was declared.
Father Thomas Hayes, assistant director of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine of the Los Angeles archdiocese, made the statement in a talk to the southwest regional convention of the Christian Family Movement.

FATHER HAYES emphasized that it is up to parents to instill motivation in their children. The three most significant motives are love of God, love of parents and love of office.

Prelate Cites Key Religious Training Needed
Spokane — (NC) — Youngsters to teach religion in state and Americans must be given more schools, but that in this country intensive religious training to try there is a general ban against such a practice.
Bishop Bernard J. Topel of Spokane declared.
He supported his contention by citing the "sorry record" of American GIs who were prisoners of the communists during the Korean conflict.
The Bishop spoke at the Sept. 11 dedication of the College of Great Falls, Mont.
Bishop Topel cited Army psychiatrists who claimed that American GIs imbued with religious principles successfully stood up against communist brainwashing when they were imprisoned in Korea.
The Church always has viewed religion as an essential part of the school's curriculum, Bishop Topel said. The view was shared by the founding fathers of this country, he stated, and only in recent times has it been perverted by agencies of religious education.
The Bishop asserted that religion must again become a regular part of public school education if this country is to continue the war against communism. He noted that clergy men in Red-ruled Poland are

AUXILIARIES of the K of C Deacon Plan Said Priest Threat

The regular business meeting of Ladies Auxiliary, Rochester Knights of Columbus, will be held Thursday, Oct. 6. Plans for the coming year will be discussed.

Rome — (NC) — The proposal to revive the office of permanent deacons needs great study, according to an article in Civiltà Cattolica, Rome magazine published by the Jesuits.
Father Giuseppe Rambaldi, S.J., notes in the periodical that the idea of ordaining deacons who would not go on to the priesthood is being championed, especially in missionary areas. Such deacons would assist naturally with a dignified remuneration.
Moreover, it must be decided whether they should be required to practice celibacy or be allowed to marry. The second solution has "the more general support," Father Rambaldi noted, "and gives rise to thoughts of the relative consequences."
Among these is the possibility that "with the freedom to marry and practice a profession, might not the deacon ultimately become a new vocation for those people (all those in the priesthood) who do not contribute toward a decrease in priestly numbers, leading them to stop at the present step, which is easier and more humanly attractive, which represents also a consecration to God?"

Week's Prayers For Paraplegics

Minister Enters Faith
Providence — (NC) — The former rector of an Episcopal church here, his wife and three children were received into the Catholic Church.
Rev. Robert E. Williams was rector of Christ Episcopal church here since 1958.
The Williams family was received into the Catholic Faith by Father Cornelius B. Collins, pastor of St. Michael's church here. Paul W. K. Thompson, English professor at Providence College, also a former Episcopal rector, and his wife, both converts, were the sponsors for the Williams family.

Citizens Group Scores Prelate
New Orleans, La. — (RNS) — Archbishop Joseph F. Rummel of the Archdiocese of New Orleans was assailed by the South Louisiana Citizens' Council, a group opposed to school desegregation, for his recent pastoral letter calling on Catholics to pray that the public schools be opened in September as scheduled.
THE ARCHBISHOP'S letter, read in all parishes of the archdiocese, was occasioned by fears that the schools will be closed because of segregationist influence. This has loomed as a possibility since federal Judge J. Skelly Wright ordered in May that the first grade be integrated when classes resume.
The Citizens' Council accused the archbishop of "interference beyond the bounds of his ecclesiastical regimen" and said his message was "an open invitation for the state to interfere in the operation of the parochial school system."
Speaking out against the possible closing of public schools, Archbishop Rummel said in his letter that no one "could evaluate the social, moral and cultural damage which such a flagrant action would inflict upon our civilization and history."
