Miss Mary E. Fitzgerald, executive director of the Ladies of Charity, was elected one of 20 directors of the national organization at the First National Assembly of the Sisters of Charity held in New York City this weekend of Sept. 24.

She is one of four directors for the northeastern section of the United States. She was also chosen for membership on the finance committee.

There were 12 chapters of the Ladies of Charity in this country representing 50,000 Catholic women. More than 1,500 of these women attended the first assembly.

THE NATIONAL association was formed to serve as a bond between the Ladies of Charity of this country and the international council in Paris. It also aims to promote unity among local chapters and to stimulate growth.

Mrs. James B. Walsh, president of the Elmira Ladies of Charity, attended the assembly as a delegate. While in New York, Mrs. Walsh, Miss Fitzgerald, who is executive director of Catholic Family Service and two staff members of the Service, Miss Patricia Dwyer and Mrs. James Owen, attended the National Conference of Catholic Charities.

## Father McMannis Talk

Hornell — Catholics should cooperate, in a spirit of genuine charity, with those of other faiths in projects which benefit the community, the Rev. E. Leo McMannis told a First Saturday

luncheon group yesterday. "As Catholics, we tend to be too much aloof,—holding ourselves apart from community activities in a clannish manner. We realize the ideal of praying together underlined by the Church in its Christian community system.

"The ideal of working together is nourished by a system such as the Diocesan Council of Catholic Women which unites women of various organizations in a strong effort for the cause of Christ."

The Rev. William H. Hickey, spiritual director of the Steuben Deaconess, introduced the speaker. He also extended an invitation to the group to attend the DCCW annual convention next Friday and Saturday in Rochester.
