Each member maintains his customary way of life in the world, but brings into his particular vocation, family life, and social life a deeper, fuller practice of Christian ideals. Secular priests, doctors, lawyers, writers, businessmen, housewives and career girls, kings, queens, and statesmen are numbered among the membership of these orders.

• The Third Order Secular of St. Dominic unites their liturgical prayer and contemplation with apostolic action. Its members about 15,000 in the United States.
