## Red Leader Blames Churches For Tensions

Berlin — (RNS) — Walter Ulbricht, newly installed head of the Soviet Zone State Council, charged that cooperation between the Soviet Zone government and church authorities has become impossible because the latter have "tied themselves to militarism and NATO."

In a lengthy speech before the East German parliament, he said all religious groups in the Soviet Zone — Protestant, Roman Catholic and Jewish — may "freely worship in their churches and synagogues."  
However, he declared, attempts to establish a "good Church - State relations" have been frustrated by the action of church leaders in "propagating and supporting" West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer's "atomic war policy."  
Ulbricht said it was a matter of gratification, however, that "an increasing number" of Protestant leaders in East Germany are beginning to understand "our attitude toward West German NATO politicians in clerical robes and the institutions they represent." This he meant, he claimed, a truer understanding of East Germany's "peace policies."

The East German leader singled out for special tribute Bishop Moritz Mitschke, head of the Lutheran Church of Thüringen, and Bishop Friedrich W. Krummacker of Greifswald, newly elected chairman of the East German Bishops' Conference of the Evangelical Church in Germany (EKD).

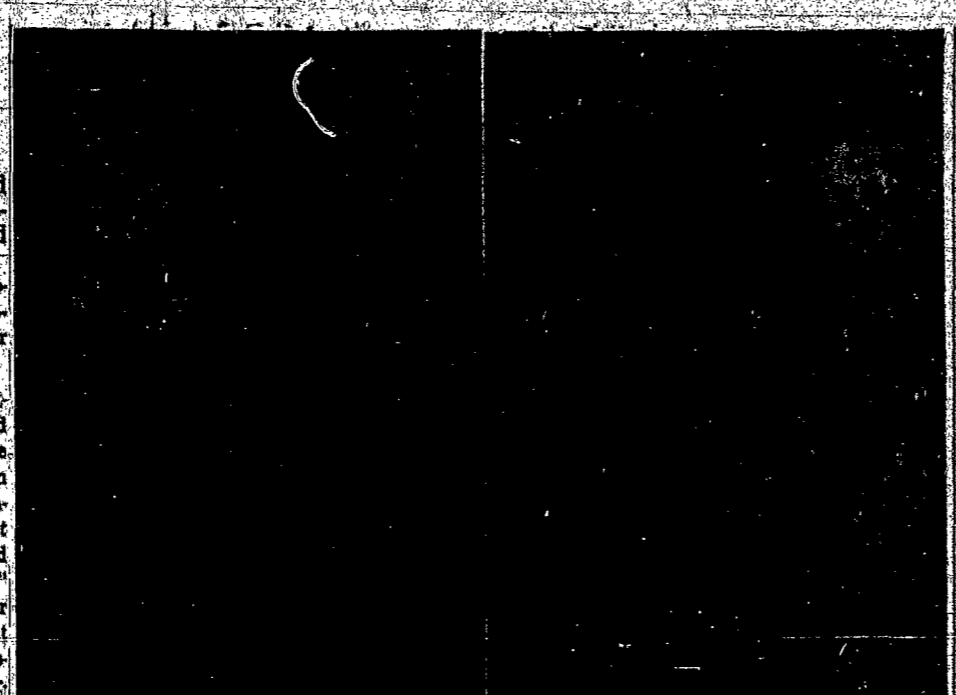

## Peru Hears Pope's Plea For Unity

Lima — (RNS) — Confidence in the ultimate victory of spiritual forces against both Communism and materialism was reflected here as hundreds of Catholics from all parts of the country gathered for the closing rites of Peru's Sixth National Eucharistic Congress.

The final day of the week-long celebrations was which Archbishop of Lima, Cardinal Juan Antonio Risco, presided. The Pope's message was read by the Rev. Fr. Juan XXIII in which he called for peace for the triumph of Christ in the world and especially for the Church of Lima and the Iron Curtain.

THE PONTIFF spoke of his burning desire for a peace everywhere and of his hopes for Christian unity which had inspired him to call the Second Vatican Council.

Asserting that the third world war is being fought in the hearts of men, Cardinal Cushing said one of the battle grounds was in the minds of men. He said the Communist government had been inaugurated under the leadership of the Blessed Sacrament led by Cardinal Cushing took place in the afternoon. The president of the congress was the Rev. Fr. John J. O'Connell.

On the previous day, dedicated to the Peruvian motherland, several thousand troops participated in a religious procession in honor of Our Lady of Mercedes, patroness of the Peruvian armed forces. Among those who received Communion from Cardinal Cushing were: Dr. Victor Andres Balaunde, president of the United Nations General Assembly, and a group of garrison officers.

## Prelate Says Understanding Key To Reunion

Newton — (RNS) — Richard Cardinal Cushing, Archbishop of Boston, urged Roman Catholics here to correct "misconceptions" separating them from members of the Orthodox Churches.

He spoke at a World Social Day observance attended by some 20,000 persons in the Boston College Alumni Stadium here. The program was dedicated to the success of the Ecumenical Council and the cause of reunification of Christians.

Catholic college students of Massachusetts formed a "Living Rosary" on the stadium field in front of a huge reproduction of the famed Russian icon, "The Mother of God." The Archbishop, who is also Archbishop of Boston, said he understood each other, then the Christlike love not to misunderstand each other.

Describing the demonstration as a "proof of our ardent desire to reach out in understanding and love to our non-Catholic neighbors," Cardinal Cushing declared: "While we talk so much about understanding and religious cooperation we must not forget the Eastern Churches. Perhaps more than any other single factor this is the obstacle to ending the schism of the Christian Church today as for many centuries."

"The Orthodox Church can severely think in terms of union where the atmosphere is such that they do not feel truly welcome. We should make every effort to correct this misconception which tends to strain our relations with our separated brethren and substitute kindness rooted in love."

The reunification of Christians, the cardinal said, will come through German-born Scripture and kindness and charity — and not through argument over dogma. He called for greater love and patience — if not the patience of Job.

Cardinal Cushing's handy, solid primer of Communism is in its third printing, and can be had for 50c if fifty copies or more are ordered. Here is a great weapon against loose talk and electioneering. Exactly what Stalin did, what we did abroad since the last war, what the Pope has said, what Khrushchev says, does, and means; what McCarthyism really was; what did happen and what is happening in China; what our policy toward Red China ought now to be — all this appears in a text as neatly and powerfully arranged as an army in battle array.

There is nothing wanting: Suggested Readings are given; Communist texts consulted are acknowledged in a Supplement which contains also a special study-section for youth. Chapter XII on how to insure the defeat of Communism is a briefing for the immediate future requiring just seven pages. Here is exactly what every voter likes as a refresher for his newspaper memory.

The Cardinal Stritch story is warmly written. A most holy and selfless character emerges, an altar Christ who had need of two Saint Johns, his "Romy" who became Bishop Roman Atkietaki, and his "Juny" ("Jun-")

## Pope Seeks Bonds With Anglicans

Liverpool — (NC) — Pope John XXIII is "all for having the greatest cooperation" with Anglicans, one of the 10 members of the secretariat on Christian unity machinery, for the first time, for passing on to appropriate Vatican offices reports on the results of such talks, he said.

Archbishop Heenan said in his statement: "When I was in August, he expressed a great affection for the Anglicans. He is all for having the greatest cooperation which is compatible with truth. ## More Pupils Attend Evening Classes

St. Paul — (RNS) — Some 500 Roman Catholic parishes of the St. Paul archdiocese have begun weekly evening school sessions for public high school students.

Father Raymond Luckey, archdiocesan director of the Contraband Christian Doctrine, said the evening classes have attracted three times as many students as the released-time classes did.

HE SAID the evening sessions are full hour in length and are held in a room surrounding the school where he is scheduled to deliver a lecture on "The Life of the Virgin Mary."

Milwaukee — (RNS) — Twenty-nine Catholic clergymen who cast absentee ballots in the September primary election here voted for a Methodist candidate who won over a Catholic.

That was disclosed when J. Jerome Finn, the defeated Catholic, challenged a recount of the ballots by the Milwaukee county election commission. Finn lost the Democratic nomination for state assemblyman in the 16th district of Milwaukee county to Wayne F. Whitlow by a vote of 1,474 to 1,471. Whitlow is a member of Kingsley Methodist church here.
