Other Nazareth students attended the rally last week which was addressed by Governor Rockefeller. They were very pleased when the Governor asked for a poster of a fighting opponent, which had been designed by a Nazareth student. The Governor said he wanted to give it to the Republican presidential candidate, and that he was sure Mr. Nixon would be delighted by this expression of Republican spirit, a speaking man said.
