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Five Parishes Launch Fund Drives, New Churches, Schools To Be Built

Five suburban Rochester parishes launched fund drives this week with a combined goal of \$550,000.

Two of the parishes were just established this year. One recently marked its first birthday; another is less than ten years old and the fifth is over a century old.

The two new parishes are Our Lady Queen of Peace and Guardian Angels.

Father James Slattery, Queen of Peace pastor, announced a minimum need of \$100,000.

The campaign goal includes the parish quota for the two new high schools.

Edward Ribson is drawing plans for the proposed Queen of Peace church and school to be built on Edgewood Ave., Brighton.

Guardian Angels pastor, Father John Kientz, currently using the Greece Regional Market for Sunday Masses, listed a goal of \$75,000 for a fund drive in that parish.

Robert Hall has drawn the plans for the new Guardian Angels church and school to be built on Castle Rd., Henrietta.

Donald VanDoren and David Quigley are chairman of the drive.

Year old St. Lawrence parish in Greece, scheduled to begin use of its new church Sunday, Oct. 30, part of Christ the King will conduct a fund drive campaign to meet \$200,000.

The new church on North Greece Road was built with ex-

tensive help of men of the parish.

It was designed by the late Walter Nugent and his executor, Phillip Winkler, contractor was Lawrence Bufano.

Father Edward Shamrock, pastor, said fund drive officers

are Donald Kridel and Karl Statknecht, chairman; John Sillit and Edwin Wegman, executive gift chairmen.

Our Lady of Mercy parish, Denise Road, also in Greece, seeks \$150,000 to build a new church and to convert existing chapel facilities.

Father John Whelan, pastor, said his goal includes a \$37,000 quota for the new high schools' campaign.

The proposed new church will be designed to serve as a hall.

Folding partitions will screen off the altar when not in use. Mass will be celebrated on Sunday, Oct. 30, following rites.

Campaign officers have not as yet been named.

Mother of Sorrows parish, the church a century-long landmark, the members will hold their annual Halloween party in the annex.

Mrs. Michael Bonfigliola is chairman and Mrs. Henry Dantel is co-chairman of the committee. Officers of the Sorrows parish committee will also assist.

Bishop To Officiate At Departure Rite

Bishop Kearney will offer Mass and preside at the Departure Ceremony of the Rev. Damien Miliken, C.S.B., this Sunday, Oct. 23 at 11 a.m. in St. Patrick's Church, Elmira.

Son of Mr. Cornelius J. Miliken and the late Sr. Miliken of Elmira, the Benedictine Father has been assigned to a mission at Tanganyika, East Africa.

In the Departure Ceremony, the new missionary makes a formal profession of faith, receives his official commission to preach the Gospel in mission lands and is presented with his mission cross from the Bishop. This is believed to be the first time that the ceremony has taken place in the Rochester Diocese.

THE BISHOP will be assisted by the Right Rev. Abbot Charles V. Carriston, O.S.B., Abbot of St. Paul's Abbey, Newton, N.Y.

The Very Rev. Msgr. Edward J. McNeill will be master of ceremonies. The Rev. Monsignors Leo G. Schwab, V.F. and Francis J. Lane will act as chaplains to the Bishop.

A delegation of Benedictine Monks from Mount Saviour Monastery, Elmira, will attend the conference of the Very Rev. Damasus Wizen, O.S.B., Tanganyika.

The late Cornelius Miliken was news editor of the Elmira Star-Gazette. He was well known throughout the Rochester Diocese for his participation in religious and civic activities.

Father Damien has two sisters in religion, Mercy Sister M. Cornelius, stationed at Our Lady of Mercy High School, and Sister M. Rosalia of St. Mary's School, Cornville.

Arrangements for Sunday's ceremony are in charge of the Rev. John S. Hayes, pastor of St. Patrick's.

FATHER DAMIEN entered the Benedictine Mission Seminary at Newton, N.Y. in 1949 and was admitted to the novitiate of St. Paul's Abbey in 1953.

He took his theological studies at St. Mary's Abbey, Morrisstown, N.J., and was ordained in May, 1958.

During the past year, Father Damien, after the University of Würzburg, Germany, his African assignment is to the Abbey Nullius of Ndama in Tanganyika.

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Beatnik Literary Move Seen Education Threat
