Third Order Secular Of Saint Francis

Part I

Membership in the Third Order

Who may belong to the Third Order? Only those may be received as members who have completed their fourteenth year and are of good Catholic and peace-loving, and above all of tried fidelity in the practice of the Catholic Faith and in loyalty to the Roman Church and the Apostolic See. These are the requirements set forth by the Rule.

One further consideration is included for married women. That they "may not be received without the husband's knowledge and consent unless their confessor judges otherwise."

(This is required in order to support the Divinely appointed order of wedlock, that the wife shall be subject to the husband.)

THUS WE see that the Third Order is meant not only for the mature and aged, but for the young as well; it sets the minimum age at a point where one is capable of understanding such an important step. Striving after perfection is not limited to adults, nor is sanctity to be saved for old age.

Some Catholics hesitate to join the Third Order, objecting that they are not good enough, not sufficiently pious. The rule does not set up holiness as one of its requirements (if so, who would dare join), but simply that one is a practical Catholic.

It is intended as a means to help ordinary, good Catholics in their efforts to serve God and to save their own souls. Nor does the Third Order exclude repentant sinners; we see this exemplified in St. Margaret of Cortona, Matt. Talbot, and others. But it does require of those the sincere will to do better.

AS TO THE "tried fidelity" of the family, "loyalty," one seeking admission must necessarily be in accord with the teaching of the Catholic Church and must manifest his submission to the wishes of the Holy See made known through the Bishops and priests.

In view of peace and harmony within the home, the rule provides for the consent of the husband in the case of a married woman. St. Francis strove to avoid anything which might cause friction among members of the family.

MOREOVER, it puts the authority of the family where it was intended to be—in the husband. In the words of St. Paul: "Let wives be subject to their husbands as to the Lord; because the husband is head of the wife, just as Christ is head of the Church."

St. Joseph's House of Hospitality has made a request to local gardeners and truck farmers to keep in mind the needs of the House during the harvest season.

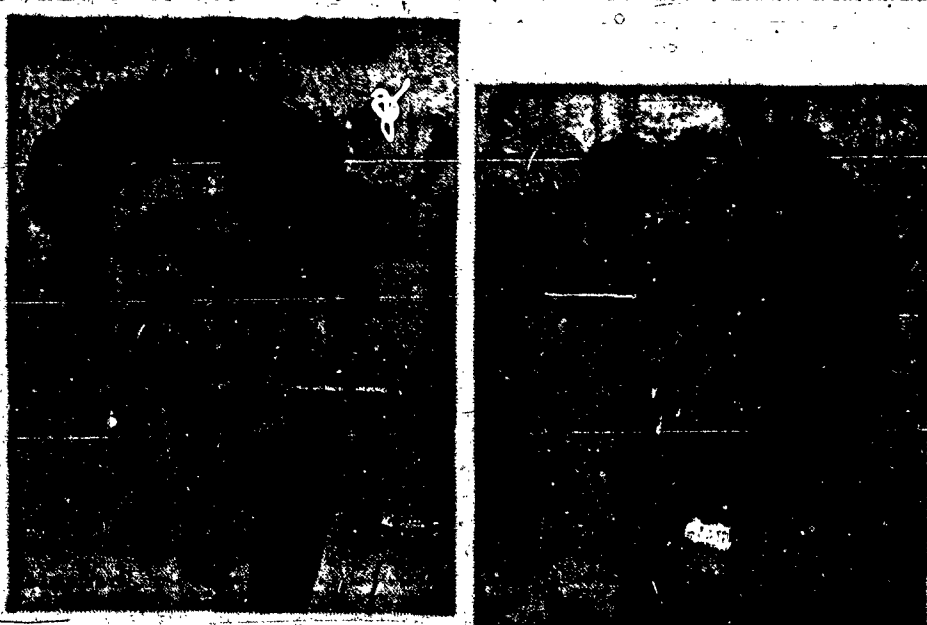
