

Fr. Roche Elected To National Slate

Rev. William M. Roche, Superintendent of Schools of the Diocese of Rochester, has been elected to the five-man Executive Committee of the National Department of Catholic School Superintendents.

This action was taken last week at the annual meeting of the Superintendents' Department of the National Catholic Educational Association.

The meeting was held in Peoria to pay tribute to the memory of Archbishop John Worcester Spalding, first Bishop of Peoria, who was a pioneer in the establishment of the Catholic system in America.

BISHOP Spalding was honored at a solemn Pontifical Mass, celebrated by the Most Rev. John B. Kain, Bishop of Peoria, at which Monsignor Edward J. Flynn, noted Catholic historian, traced the contributions made by the first Bishop of Peoria to parochial education.

Father Roche was chairman for a panel discussion of the use of television in the school curriculum. Bishop James F. McGuire of Cheyenne Hills told the assembled superintendents that the technical discoveries of our age, including television, are part of God's providential solution of the educational problems peculiar to our day.

"We need today a spirit of Christian daring, to work for the purpose of education in the technological contributions of science," Bishop McGuire asserted.

OTHER PANELISTS pointed out specific aspects of the instructional uses of television. Rev. John Cuklin, S.J., noted it as an incidental consequence of the open circuit TV system that the general public, seeing callers of teaching needs by Catholic school personnel, will come to appreciate the Catholic education. In more than a "little Catechism, a six sat," and some May Devotions."

Dr. Max Beberman of the University of Illinois addressed the superintendents on the trend toward new Mathematics. The "Teaching Through Art" program, featuring unique methods of teaching mathematics, was presented by Dr. Beberman.

Other speakers included Dr. C. L. Tamm, Director of Curriculum of School Testing Program; the value of films in

Corningite Named Bishop Of Tucson

Corning — A Corning native, the Most Rev. Francis Green, has been named Bishop of the Diocese of Tucson, Ariz., following the resignation of Bishop Daniel Gercke, 84.

Bishop Green had been conductor with right of succession since March 11, 1948, having served as St. Peter and Paul Parish Church in Tucson and vicar general of the diocese. He was auxiliary to Bishop Gercke from 1953 until May this year, when he became coadjutor.

A son of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Green, he was born in Corning July 30, 1904, and was educated in St. Joseph Seminary in California and at St. Patrick's Seminary, Menlo Park, Calif., and ordained in 1932 at Tucson.

After serving as an assistant at St. Augustine's Cathedral, Tucson, from 1932 to 1934, Bishop Green was named pastor of Our Lady of Mount Carmel Church, Tucson, Ariz. In 1937, he was named pastor of St. Peter and Paul Church in Tucson.

Named titular bishop of Serra and auxiliary bishop of Tucson by Pope Pius XII in 1948, Bishop Green was consecrated on September 17 that year.

Bishop Green has been a frequent visitor to Corning during the years and usually visited at the home of the late Miss Maud Head of 10 E. Fourth St.

Pope John XXIII appointed Gercke, recently deceased, as his personal representative to the International Congress of Religious Education, held in Rome Oct. 1-5.

The changes were announced today in Washington, D.C., through Archbishop Middle Vassouras, apostolic delegate to the United States.

Gercke was born Oct. 9, 1874, at Holzmühle, Philadelphia, Pa., and was educated at St. Joseph's College, Philadelphia, and St. Charles Borromeo Seminary, Overbrook, Pa. He was ordained in 1901.

He served parishes in Philadelphia and in the Philippines, then returned to Philadelphia as rector of the Cathedral of Sts. Peter and Paul. He moved from that post to the Tucson diocese in 1923.

A titular see in one which flourished in early days of the church but is now extinct, assigned to a bishop who did not have a residential see, Cornewall, Bishop of Tucson in 1923.
