

## Holy Trinity Sets Musical Comedy

"Broadway on the Ridge," a musical comedy, will be presented at Holy Trinity School Hall on Nov. 4, 5 and 6. The script, an original story written by Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Barrett, and family, embraces several song hits from Rodgers and Hammerstein's show: "South Pacific," "The King and I," "Oklahoma," "Sound of Music" and "My Fair Lady."

The show is being directed by stage-director Lloyd Hubbard, and musical-director Lois Gilbert. Hubbard is a veteran of many years in show business. Presently, he is the stage-director for K.F.A.
