SERMONETTE
IS YOUR LIFE OFF KEY?

When some people sit at the piano all within hearing range run for the great outdoors. A frightened tomat fleeing from the neighbor's airside could do about as well if the keyboard happened to be in the path of his escape route. Another person sits at the same piano and plays a beautiful melody, capturing the spirit of the composer and captivating all those who are fortunate enough to hear.
No one blames the piano for producing raucous rumblings from untrained fingers. The piano is able to produce thrilling melodies or discordant drivel.
Life is much like the piano. All of us are given life freely. You and I didn't ask to be born. We didn't deserve to be born. But we have this life to use. Life like a piano may produce many off key notes or it may be harmonious according as we are able to use it.
The master who sits at the piano and thrills all by his ability did not come to this piano in a day. It was accomplished after long, hard years of practice. First, he learned music is a great discipline. He could not punch just any key if he hoped to produce a pleasing effect. In the hours of practice he learned that if one followed the rules of music, the result could be beautiful. It could bring true joy to the soul.
Anyone can sit at a piano and produce sound. In some cases it may even be more than just noise. It may be pleasant. But it will be beautiful whether it comes from the trained hand of one who has practiced long or one who perhaps plays by ear in proportion as it conforms with the basic rules of music.
It is not a great accomplishment, just to be alive. There are times when living is hard. It would be much easier to die.
But the same God who made the laws of sound made the laws of living. The same God who formed the principles on which theory and practice of music is based made the laws of life. If we study His laws of life and try to follow them then our lives will be harmonious and happy. After all, God made us didn't He? He knows what is best for you and me.

Southern Baptists Gain In Northeast
New York — (RNS) — Expansion of Southern Baptist work in the Northeastern U.S. was highlighted at a meeting here attended by 221 delegates from 65 10-state region. Representatives of all Southern Baptist Convention boards also were present.
(The group is currently active opposing Senator John Kennedy's bid for the presidency because he is a Catholic.)
The denomination's first northeastern church was organized at Niagara Falls, N.Y., in 1894.
Its growth in the area is typical of the thrust it has made into 30 states since 1941 in response to calls from members already there, said Dr. A. B. Cash of Atlanta, Ga., secretary of the Southern Baptist Home Mission Board's Department of Foreign Missions.
IN THESE "pioneer" states the growth is not as rapid as in the Northeast. Until the outbreak of World War II and the national population shifts that followed, the Convention had been active only in the Southern and a few Western states.
Despite the gains, speakers stressed the need for increased efforts to extend the work in the Northeast.
"We need," said Dr. Cash, "to be as aggressive as we can be in the Northeast."

Mission Helpers Honored

Ithaca—At a special Mass of the things of God, Thanksgiving celebrated Sunday, Oct. 30, in immaculate Conception Church, Very Rev. Donald M. Cleary, pastor of St. Catherine of Siena Parish of Ithaca, paid tribute to the Mission Helpers of the Sacred Heart for their ten years of missionary accomplishments in Ithaca and the surrounding area.
Msgr. Cleary said it was due to the vision and foresight of the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William Byrne, who realized the necessity of a vast program of religious instruction for the Catholic children in his parish, that the Mission Helpers came to Ithaca.
"THE MIND OF MAN is made to know truth," Msgr. Cleary said. "This being true, what a great vocation it is to be able to go out and to develop the minds of these young and eager students to help them appreciate something of the nature of God, and to answer their questions—Where did I come from, Why am I here, and Where am I going?"

Bishop Sheil Story Set On 'This Is Your Life'

Chicago — (RNS) — The story of Auxiliary Archbishop Bernard J. Sheil of Chicago, the Windy City's beloved "shirt-sleeved bishop," will be told Nov. 20 to a nationwide television audience on "This Is Your Life."
Although he is the star of the show—already videotaped—Bishop Sheil won't be able to see the program. He will be in Philadelphia "that night" accepting an International Commendation Award from the State of Israel.
The 72-year-old prelate, noted for his work among youth and for his pronouncements on social justice, was tricked into appearing on the program. He went to St. Andrew's School gymnasium here to perform on what he thought was an NBC-TV special events program.
INSIDE the gymnasium, Ralph Edwards greeted the archbishop and the secret was out. Bishop Sheil then was "tricked" in a motorcade with police escort to Chicago's Civic State University.
