

Concern Can't Slacken

Refugees Need Still Urgent

Geneva — (RNS) — A Vatican observer told the Executive Committee of the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees at its fourth session here that the World Refugee Year could not solve the problem of the displaced and homeless.

He said it was impossible to relax their efforts as a result of the year and more help must be contributed than ever before.

Father Henri de Riedmatten, O.P., said it was of "capital importance" that the increased concern for refugees aroused during the year should not be allowed to slacken.

Nothing that private contributions to the year have surpassed government allocated funds, the priest urged that

Czech Prelate Again Arrested By Reds

Vatican City — (RNS) — An 82-year-old Roman Catholic bishop has been re-arrested by Communist authorities in Czechoslovakia, Osservatore Romano, Vatican City newspaper, reported.

It said Bishop Jan Vojtasak of Spil was released from prison last March, but was taken into custody again allegedly for refusing to obey orders of the State Office for Church Affairs.

OSSEVATORIO cited the new arrest of Bishop Vojtasak as evidence of the continued persecution of the Church at the hands of the Prague regime. In its report it noted that 12 new priests were ordained in Bratislava last June but it said this is an insignificant number in view of the great need for priests in Czechoslovakia.

Known as an exemplary prelate and a man of great charity and apostolic zeal, Bishop Vojtasak has been a long-term victim of Communist persecution.

He was first arrested in April, 1945, along with Auxiliary Bishop Michael Buzalka of Trnava because of his outspoken anti-Communist attitude. However, anti-Communist repercussions among the people caused the authorities to release both bishops.

In the summer of 1950, Bishop Vojtasak was again arrested, along with Bishop Buzalka and four other members of the Czechoslovak hierarchy. In January 1951, he and Bishop Buzalka were brought to trial.

Glimpse of Hope

Atomic Experts Hear Peace Plea

Vienna — (RNS) — Franz Cardinal Koenig, Archbishop of Vienna, told delegates to the fourth general conference here of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) that they have a heavy responsibility for the future of mankind.

He preached at a special High Mass in St. Stephen's Cathedral which the delegates attended on an invitation extended by the Vatican's delegation to the conference.

"GIVE TO THE world a glimpse of hope, so that god will find a way, even though this may not seem possible," he urged. "We all know that the responsibilities of the delegates of the IAEA are very heavy for the future of mankind. Next to the political leaders of the world, the delegates to the conference have their own special responsibility."

Previously Cardinal Koenig blessed the first Austrian atomic reactor at a solemn ceremony. The reactor was then set in motion by President Adolf Schurf, of Austria.

The cardinal said that last year's conference of the IAEA gave the world a good example when it was decided to send scientists to the smaller countries and in addition to provide them with scholarships.

"In doing this," he told the delegates, "you showed that mutual help exists not only between individuals but between nations. May your work be successful and may God bless you."

Cardinal Koenig preached in English. He read the Gospel of the Mass in English, French, Spanish and Russian—the four languages of the conference. Among those attending the Mass were Dr. Georgi Nadjakov of Bulgaria, and Sterling Cole of the United States, president and general secretary.
