

Missioner Builds Bridge


Acota — (NC) — A U.S. missionary has bridged the gap between 20,000 Peruvians and the outside world.

Families living in rural areas here, some 12,000 feet above sea level and about 21 miles from Puno, had long dreamed of the day when a permanent bridge would span the treacherous Acota river and link them economically and socially with city life.

Father Charles F. Girnius, M.M., of Maspeth, N.Y., made the dream a reality by turning the bridge problem into a community project. He used volunteer labor and built a 75-foot, rock and concrete bridge that cost only \$800.

"Without Padre Carlos, we would have waited another 25 years for our bridge," said the Mayor of Acota at the dedication ceremony.

The new bridge has spurred the people to undertake another venture: They are drawing blueprints to build a heavy-duty road between Acota and the hinterlands.

East Rites In France

Vatican City — (NC) — Pope John XXIII has set up two Church jurisdictions in France, for the Byzantine and the Armenian Rites.

Father Vladimir Malanchuk, C.S.S.R., superior of the Ukrainian vicarariate of the Redemptorists in Canada, was named Titular Bishop of Epphana in Syria and Apostolic Exarch of the new Apostolic Exarchate for Ukrainian Catholics of the Byzantine Rite living in France.

Father Garabed Amakouni, a monk of the Order of Mechitarists of Venice, was appointed Apostolic Exarch for Armenian Rite Catholics living in France. Father Amakouni, a consultant of the Pontifical Commission for the Codification of Oriental Canon Law, is devoted to the titular Diocese of Amathus in Cyprus.
