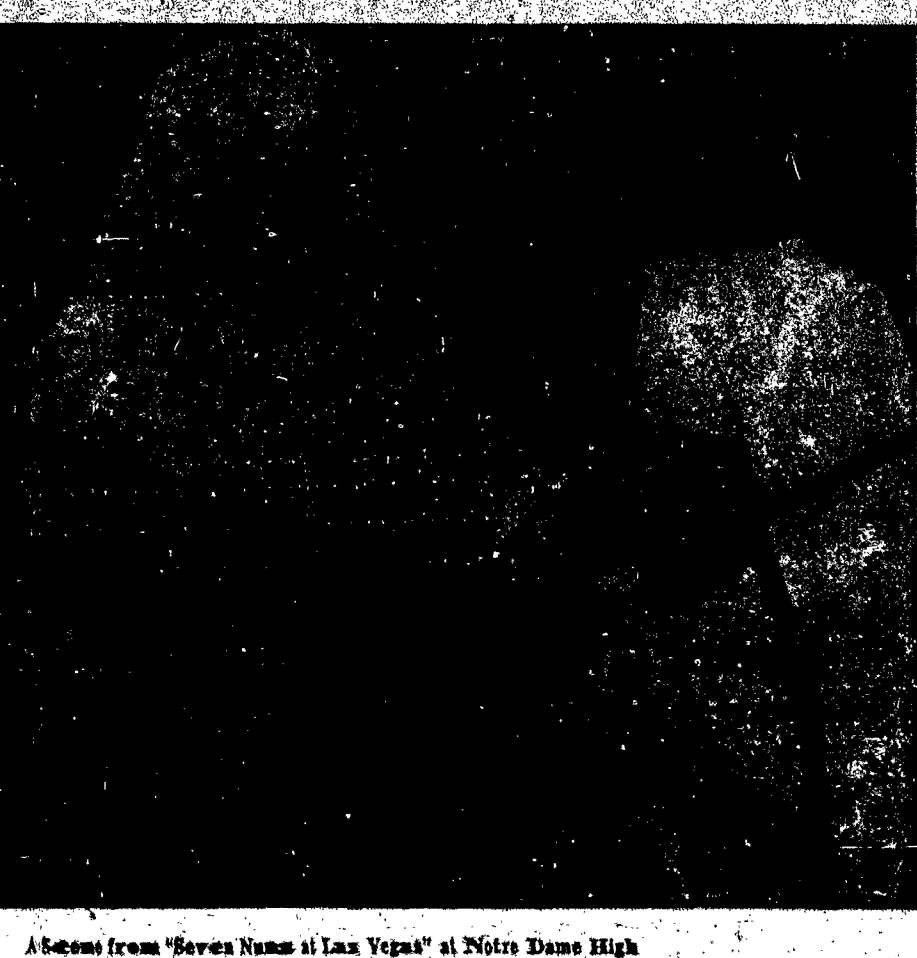

The play is an imaginative treatment of the biblical story of Noah and the Ark and it explores the theme through family, man-comedy and tragedy.

Editor To Interview Humistons On WHAM

Cromey — Capt. Julia G. Humiston, USMC, retired, and Mr. Humiston will be interviewed in a recording Wednesday, Nov. 10, by Louise Wilson, fashion editor of the Catholic Courier, and editor of Woman's World on WHAM.

The interview will be broadcast in the "Woman's World" program from 10:05 a.m. to 11 a.m.

THE RECORDING was made at their Fatima Farm home in Stanley, RD. While on their weekly trip in 1954, the Humistons spent a week at Fatima in Portugal. They were guests of the Mother Superior, Consolata Mimoso Semolina, and in addition to the visit to Fatima, they visited all over Portugal. They named their farm after Fatima.

The Humistons visited every scene in connection with the apparition of Our Lady. They had a personal interview with the Lady of Fatima, and met all the living relatives of the three children.

MR. HUMISTON is president of the Catholic Science-News League of the Rochester Diocese, Council of the National Council of Catholic Women. He is also a member of the Speakers Bureau of the NCCW and has given several talks throughout the diocese on the subject of Fatima.

Decency Legion Condemns Movie

New York — (NC) — The National Legion of Decency has called the German movie "Magdalena," a blasphemous violation of decency and placed it in its condemned class.

The legion also announced that it has placed the movie "Crowning Experience" in its Separate Classification. The movie, dealing with the program of Moral Re-Armament, a quasi-religious movement, was produced by MRA.

"The low moral tone which permeates the development of the theme of this film," pronounced in testimony of a blatant violation of decency in expressions, dialogue and situations," the legion objected to the "Magdalena" movie.

Regarding "Crowning Experience," the legion said: "This message film which presents the program of Moral Re-Armament, a quasi-religious movement, should be viewed by a Catholic audience with certain reservations because the film relies too heavily upon emotional argument and because the religious expression which it gives to personal reform is theologically ambiguous."
