## Give Thanks, Feed Hungry US Urged

Augusta, Ga.—(NC)—President Eisenhower, in his annual Thanksgiving Day proclamation, called for Americans to give thanks to God on Nov. 24 for the blessings bestowed on the United States.

He also urged Americans to celebrate Thanksgiving Day by helping to supply food to the world's hungry. He asked for additional support for the food-for-peace program which is being conducted voluntarily by citizens and religious groups.

The President said:

"IT IS FITTING and appropriate at this time of national thanksgiving that we should remember and respond to the needs of those of other lands."

"I call upon our people, while giving thanks for our blessings, to direct their thoughts to the peoples of other lands less fortunate than we."

"In particular I urge my fellow Americans to support and assist the efforts which we as a Nation, working individually and in cooperation with other Nations, are directing toward the solution of the world's food problem."

"Let us hope that some day, under a benevolent Providence and through the best use of the world's God-given resources, each Nation will have reason to celebrate its own Thanksgiving Day."

## Monroe County Parishes Report On Campaign

A report total of \$4,810,387 in the Catholic High Schools Campaign, this week, sent pledge totals \$734,025 over the minimum goal. Diocesan gifts totaled \$109,920 and special gifts \$624,105.

New business gifts were highlighted by \$10,000 from Lawless Bros. Paper Mills, and Genesee Brewing Company's \$7,500. (Others listed on this page).

In parish reports, six figures were attained by the following parishes: Sacred Heart Cathedral, Holy Rosary, St. Charles, St. John the Evangelist, Greece, St. Margaret Mary, St. Thomas, St. Ambrose in regions I and II and St. Augustine, Holy Family, St. Monica, Blessed Sacrament in Regions III and IV. (Tabulation of parishes with goal passed indicated below.)

With the maximum goal exceeded, campaign leaders are now directing all efforts of workers in a maximum report for Bishop Kearney on Wednesday, Nov. 10 which will assure him of sufficient pledges to cover the stem-free high schools.

Patrons, parish moderators, general chairmen, secretaries and workers are being congratulated this week throughout Monroe County for having realized the maximum potential of the campaign.

The minimum goal of \$4,100,000 now achieved, campaign organizers are reporting everywhere to raise the \$6,200,000 cost of the new high schools, or more.

The Memorial Reservation closed Wednesday, Nov. 10. Any memorials to be reported may be called in at campaign headquarters, 127 East Ave., telephone EA 5-4575.

**THE TWO SCHOOLS** will be the Bishop Kearney High School to be built on King Highway, Irondequoit, and Cardinal Mooney High School, Malden Lane, Greece. Their total enrollment will be 3,200 boys and girls to be taught in separate classrooms by separate staffs.

Pope John will celebrate his seventy-ninth birthday on Nov. 25. As a tribute to His Holiness, Bishop Kearney has asked priests of the diocese to offer one Mass for the Pope's intention and an extra elevation for the Pontiff to be added in all Masses celebrated on Nov. 24. The Bishop has also directed that the theme of all parishes on Sunday, Nov. 27 should be "Our Holy Father" and that an appeal for special prayers be made for the Pope's intentions. Permission also has been granted for a special evening Mass on the 25th for the Holy Father. Bishop Kearney will lead the Rosary on Sunday, Nov. 27 at 7 p.m. over Radio Station WDAY and asks that the Sisters of our convents join him in this special prayer for Pope John.

## Mother Of President-elect

Motherlike, Mrs. Rose Fitzgerald Kennedy enjoys talking about her children. And, motherlike, too, she plays no favorites, notwithstanding a pre-election拜託 in the family.

AT SUNDAY dinner Mrs. Kennedy would start the questions: "What was the Gospel today?" "What was the color of the priest's vestments?" "What does red signify?" "What is a martyr?" When the Kennedy youngsters visited a zoo they immediately thought of the lions in connection with the early Christian martyrs, and of the martyrs in relation to red vestments.

Mrs. Kennedy was interviewed during her trip through North Carolina in connection with the presidential campaign of her son, Sen. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts, the Democratic nominee.

Whenever she was asked to recount some achievement of the son she calls "Jack," she was also quick to list accomplishments of the other members of her family.

Mrs. Kennedy recalled that she taught her children the Christmas story with the aid of picture books.

She was asked whether the Senator was an altar boy. She replied: "All of my boys were altar boys. Bobby served when he was so tiny that he could hardly lift the book." Robert Kennedy was the first American child to receive his First Communion from a reigning Pontiff.

Mrs. Kennedy said that when Pope Pius XII, as Cardinal Eugenio Pacelli, came to the United States, he visited us and brought each of the children a souvenir — a white moccasin (moccasin).

Even while discussing some of the honors that have come to Sen. Kennedy — an honorary degree from the University of Notre Dame, the Cardinal Gibbons Medal of the Catholic University of America alumni association, the Christopher book award — Mrs. Kennedy made certain her other children weren't neglected.

"Patricia worked with Father Patrick Peyton in the Family Hour Crusade," she said. Jean was very active in the Christopher movement with Father James Keller. Eunice has worked with retarded children and now has her second foster child. Of the boys, Ted has been the most active in the Joseph P. Kennedy, Jr., Foundation — named for the son who lost his life in World War II — which aids retarded children.

"I have known John J. Kennedy for many years," Mrs. O'Malley said. "I consider him an excellent deacon (Catholic) and at all times he has been a source of inspiration. We have had a wonderful display. You know, we have our annual Mass, according to St. Michael the Archangel, Oct. 29, at 11:30 A.M. Come, I invite you to come."

## Clothing Drive To Aid Needy

Several thousand volunteers from parish organizations will process tons of usable clothing expected next week at some 150 parish collection centers throughout the Diocese.

In preparation for the Catholic Bazaar's twelfth annual Thanksgiving Clothing Collection to begin this Sunday and continue through Thanksgiving week, a special appeal of Bishop Kearney was read last Sunday at all Masses.

In his letter Bishop Kearney said Catholics continue the centuries-old tradition of charity. "The urgent need, though, continues," he said. "God Christ in His poverty still guides us to help."

Patrons will announce this Sunday the locations and hours of their collection centers which will sort, pack and ship the donations of usable clothing to the Bazaar processing plant in the Catholic Bazaar.

Each parish bears the expense of shipment to the Bazaar address.
