Mobil Mass For West Germans

Koenigstein (CRNS) — Fourteen new mobile chapels are blessed in a ceremony at Koenigstein in West Germany. The chapels are the products of the "Aid for Eastern Priests organization," a society founded in 1949 by Premonstratensian Father Weremfried van Straten. The society has contributed numerous other vehicles and books, food parcels and briefcases for refugees from Russian satellite countries. But the needs of the heroic priests serving the "priests of tomorrow" remain great.

Church Membership Gains

New York (CRNS) — Membership in churches and synagogues of this country's 50 states increased by 2,658,164 or 24 per cent — in 1959 for a record total of 11,228,905.

Last year 63.4 per cent of America's estimated total population of more than 178,000,000 belonged to a church or synagogue — highest ratio of religious affiliation to the number of people in U.S. history. In 1958 the ratio was 49 per cent of the population at that time.

While the estimated American population increased by 1.8 per cent between 1958 and 1959, however, church and synagogue membership gained 84.4 per cent in relation to the number of people.

The Yearbook also gave 494,483 as the total number of members in Old Catholic, Polish National Catholic and American Church of North America parishes.

With respect to Protestant and Catholic church membership, the Yearbook pointed out that the most Protestant churches enumerated as members persons who have attained full membership, usually at the age of 13.

Catholics regard all baptized persons, including children, as members.

In major Protestant "family" groups, Baptist bodies reported the highest inclusive membership figures for 1959 — 20,879,220. The next five largest "families" were: Methodist, 12,358,861; Lutheran, 8,023,091; Presbyterian, 4,202,936; Christian Churches (Disciples of Christ) and the Churches of Christ, 3,809,064; and Eastern Orthodox, 2,807,812.

A little female with a very big mouth gets on the phone, calls her girl friend and says, "I promised I would never say anything about Gert unless it was good — and no kidding, this is good. This is really good."

Here she is, the little human vacuum cleaner, going around sucking up all the dirt she can and then cracking the bag to the wind. Somebody should really lean on this type of person.

I wonder, what is this strange, nervous urge that comes over us the minute we are entrusted with a secret? What is this obsession that presses us to reveal what has been life with us in deepest confidence? We just can't seem to keep our mouths shut. Like the lady who says, "What's the use of suffering in silence if nobody knows about it?"

The classic pattern for keeping secrets can be found in the priest and his seal of confession. "A priest might break his heart but he will never break his seal. He might make many mistakes but never the big one. Never, even in the face of death, will he reveal secrets left with him in that dark box of Penance."

When someone lets you in on a secret, trust there is no such seal imposed upon you. But the keeping of that secret should be no less sacred. Abuses are legion in this department. Loose gums are so common; it seems the only way to keep a secret is to tell nobody. Absolutely nobody.

But you say, "Aw, I'm only going to tell my best friend. We have no secrets." But remember, she has a best friend, and her best friend has a best friend. So, just tell your best friend only; and when you awaken the next morning, everybody in the world knows it.

Let's all make an intense study of our ability or inability to keep a secret. If you must honestly admit that you just can't be trusted with a secret, then please have the decency to wear a big sign on your back, "I AM A BLABBERMOUTH. DON'T TELL ME ANYTHING." But if you decide that you are honorable enough to keep a secret, then make sure you do.

Integration Plea In Oklahoma

Oklahoma City (RNS) — Protestant, Catholic and Jewish groups here have publicly endorsed a statement by the Governor's Committee on Human Rights calling for an end to racial discrimination in public eating places.

Among those supporting the statement were the Oklahoma City Council of Churches, United States, especially the Catholic Diocese of Oklahoma City and Tulsa, and the Oklahoma City Jewish Community Council.

"Without a decision to end this kind of discrimination," said the statement by the Governor's Committee, "we face the probability of developments which will harm our state's enviable record of progress in this field."

"Overwhelming evidence from the many cities which have ended this form of discrimination in recent months clearly indicates that this feat is groundless."

The Council of Churches, which termed segregation "un-Christian, un-democratic and inhuman," called for a series of suggestions to all area Protestant churches, urging that parishes be alerted to the integration problem and be given opportunity to express their feelings about it. The Negroes be invited to speak at the issue in white churches, and that Sunday schools regularly teach children about integration.

Sermons on resolving racial tensions also were recommended, as well as a statement by the church board to make clear the church's position on the matter.

Catholic Bishop Victor J. Reed congratulated the Governor's Committee members for their "prompt and clear statement" and Gov. J. Howard Edmondson for establishing the 20-member group.

"No accident of birth," declared Bishop Reed, "especially of color or nationality, should be a handicap."

Handicap From Piety

Niagara Falls (NC) — American Catholics must develop a deep and abiding sense of international outlook, the president of the Catholic Press Association said here.

Speaking at the fourth annual convention of the National Catholic Social Action Conference, Father Albert J. Nevins, 4344 34th St., declared:

"We must make our Catholics realize that Christianity is not true Christianity unless it reaches out to all mankind."

The Catholic Church in America was never afflicted with a greater handicap than the "Jesus and I" concept of religion which was taught for so many years in our parochial schools," he said.
