Fisher Debates In Syracuse

The Fisher Forum of St. John Fisher College sent a team to the debating tournament sponsored by the University of Syracuse on Saturday, Dec. 3.

Fourth Degree Hears Talk On Delco Products

Facts about products and research of Delco Division, General Motors were heard in a talk by Sheldon Smith, engineer of the company, preceding the Rochester Fourth Degree Assembly, Knights of Columbus meeting, Tuesday, Nov. 29.

The engineer told of various items made by Delco including automatic lifts for windows, six-way electric seats, as well as motors for windshield wipers, heaters and defrosters. He said that power assists are becoming more and more important as cars become increasingly automatic. Surveys are made to keep up with the public demands.

Smith said that the production of motors for heaters and defrosters runs from 20,000 to 30,000 per month which means that the total production for motors for all items would amount to 12,000,000 per year. In this connection he said these products are used on all General Motors cars as well as some other makes.

SPEAKING of the relative merits of the vacuum windshield wiper as compared to the electric, he said that since 1959 they have concentrated on the latter. Among other reasons for the change he said was that legislation in some states compelled them to do so.

Electric controls of the roads owing to higher speeds, he said are not in the too distant future. This will be accomplished he intimated through the use of gyro from present indicators.

The meeting was thrown open and the discussion was presided over by Smith and Norman Laney also from Delco.

Each month the Fourth Degree Assembly invites a representative of local industry to talk at the meeting to create an interest in the community plans as well as from the educational standpoint.
