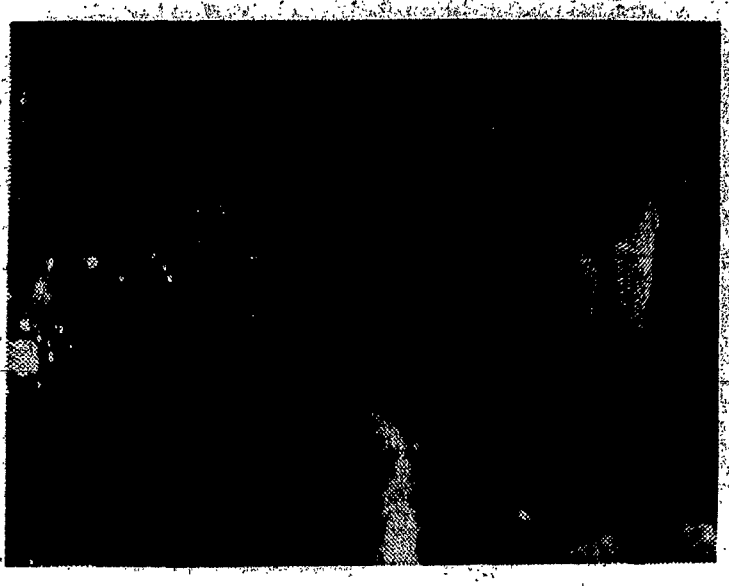

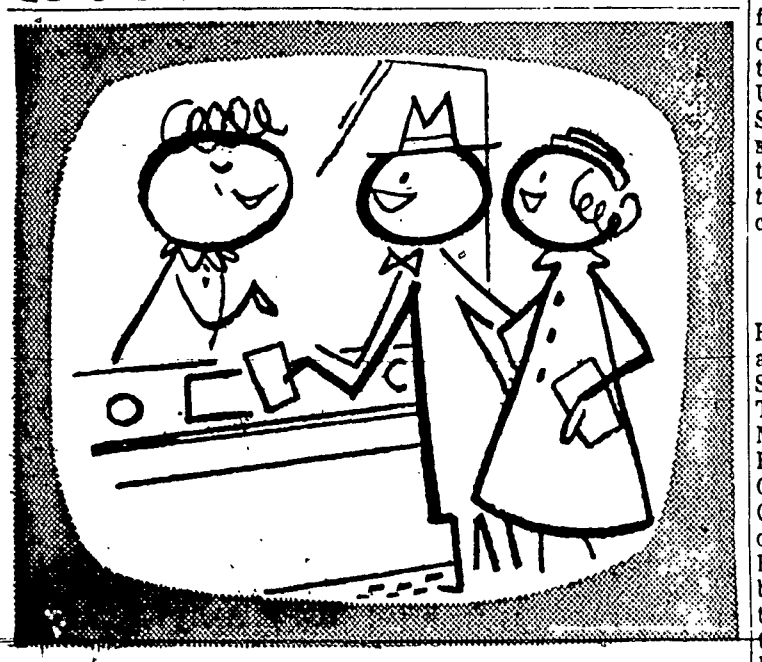

Liturgy Teams Teach Participation In Rites

Peoria — (NC) — Special demonstration teams have been organized by the Peoria Diocesan Commission on Sacred Liturgy, Music and Art to aid parishes in carrying out the Holy See's liturgical directives.

The teams will be available to local pastors to appear before groups to teach practical methods and procedures in the recited and sung Mass.


OTHER STEPS announced by the commission include preparation of a list of the best books and pamphlets available for developing a parish program and circulation of a questionnaire to get an accurate picture of liturgy, music, and art in the diocese.

Bishop John B. Franz of Peoria has urged priests of the diocese to take advantage of the commissions work to put into effect the Holy See's directives. He admitted that satisfactory performance of the recited or sung Mass is a slow process, but insisted: "An earnest start must be made."


