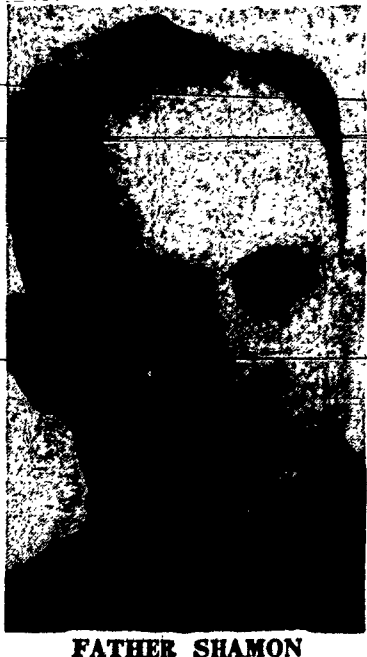
St. Lawrence Pastor Listed By Friday Club
