Aquinas, McQuaid
Win 2 Of 4

Using a blistering second half, Aquinas defeated
Syracuse North-73-55. The Irish, trailing at the end of
the first stanza 15-16, had gained the lead early in the
second quarter and then piled
up a commanding bulge after
the intermission.

Gary Page paced the well-
balanced Irish scoring with 14
points. Rog LaForce scored 13,
and Jim Chatterton added 11
more.

Unbeaten Franklin ran its
streak to 18 straight over two
seasons by humbling the Little
Irish 68-35. The Quakers,
defenders in the early stages,
checked tenaciously by Aquinas
broke loose behind the shooting
of Trent Jackson and Bill Slater
to win handily and spoil hopes
of an upset victory. Junior Jim
Chatterton tallied 18 to spark
Aquinas.

MCQUAID CAGERS raced to
an easy 70-33 victory over Ed-
son Tech last Saturday night.
Tom Tisa gained scoring honors
with 14 points and spearheaded
the Knights win. Richie Ide,
Frank Zona, Don Robinson and
Jerry Rohrer contributed a
combined total of 35 to aid the
winners cause. The quarter
leads had rocketed in the
Knights favor—14-3, 37-11, and
56-21.

Five points was the difference
as MT. CARMEL of Auburn
beat Bishop McQuaid 57-
52. Although McQuaid staged a
4th quarter rally, Mt. Carmel's
commanding lead assured vic-

10-8, 29-21, and 43-31. Hickey

ability. Niagara's front line of
Maddrey, Glenn and Jones
ranks second nationally in re-
bounding. The Eagles have com-
plemented this with good out-
side play of Rochester's Al But-
ler, Len Whalen, and Andy
O'Connell.

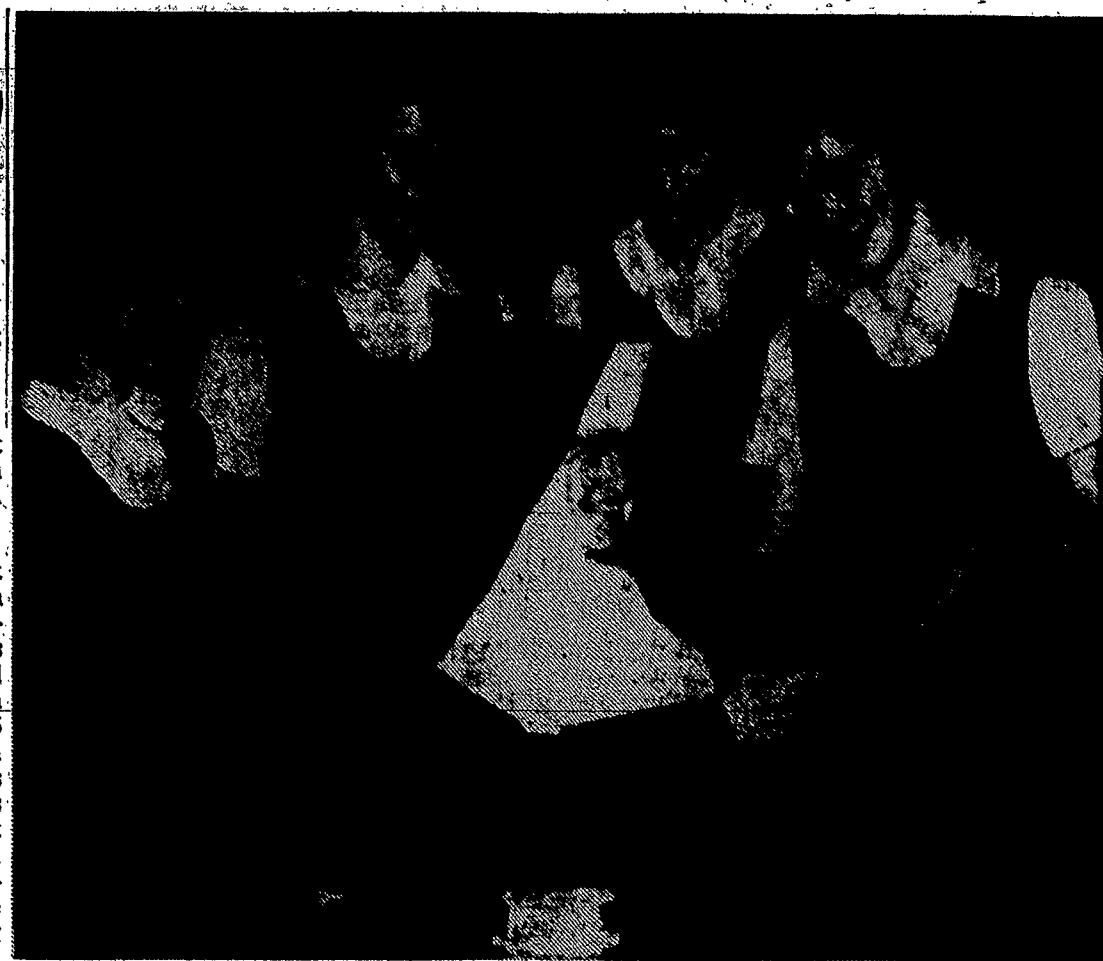
Wilt Chamberlain, generally
called basketball's greatest in-
dividual, is involved in one of
the most baffling problems in
the 15 year history of the NBA.
The 7 foot-1 inch phenom sports
a 38 point average and de-
votates opponents with a variety
of shots that include dunks,
fallaway jumpers, and tap-ins.

Yet the "Big Dipper" has had
plenty of trouble at the charity
line—his free throw percentage
is only about 48. The critics say
his failure to get the one-
pointers is due to a lack of
practice, lack of concentration
and lack of confidence. One
NBA veteran points out that to
overcome this perplexing prob-
lem, Wilt "must get the me-
chanics of foul-shooting down
pat and stick to a method even
if at first it doesn't produce re-
sults."

It is desire that has made the
pro that he is. He enjoys the
Nat's Dolph Schayes the fine
game with the enthusiasm of a
youngster. He's not a special-
ist; he is an all-around cager,
rating high in scoring, rebound-
ing, and assists. Dolph has
proved his durability by per-
forming in over 600 consecutive
games, and he hopes to continue
this streak. His trademark, un-
usual for a big man, is a two-
handed set.

Oscar (Big O) Robertson,
Cincinnati's prize rookie, was
recently named MVP in the all-
star classic at Syracuse. Joe
Lapchick said "watching him
play makes me want to tear
up the seats. This is the pro's
pro, the kind of player you
must enjoy watching..." Mid-
way in the NBA season, Oscar
was No. 3 in scoring, No. 2 in
field goal percentage, and the
leader in assists.
