Sister Mary Francis will be chairman of Nazareth College's Music Department beginning with the second semester, it was announced this week by Sister Helen Daniel, college president.

THE MUSIC Department was organized in 1934 by Sister Kathleen, who has been chairman since that time. Sister will continue as head of the Graduate Division in Music.

Since its inception, the Music Department has graduated more than 100 students. Most of these graduates have become teachers in the public schools of New

York State. Several have won scholarships for further study in music at home and abroad. At the present time, there are about 40 undergraduate students in the Music Department, which prepares its majors to teach on both elementary and secondary levels. The course at Nazareth has the full approval of the New York State Department of Education.

Church Unity At Aquinas

The Church Unity Octave was inaugurated Wednesday of last week at Aquinas Institute with the Sacrifice of the Mass offered in the Byzantine-Slavonic Rite. Celebrant of the Mass was Rev. Nicholas Wolensky, pastor of St. Joseph Church, who gave a commentary on the Eastern Rite before the Mass began. During the Mass the students prayed for the success of the forthcoming General Council and for the Holy Father's intention of unity among all peoples in the true Church of Christ.

Rev. Robert Chauvin, C.S.B., director of the Octave committee, pointed out to the students that the Chair of Unity Octave is rather new in the Church. He spoke of its beginning in New York in 1908 and recalled that in 1916, Pope Benedict XV extended its observance to the Universal Church.

Because the student body was writing mid-year examinations each student was asked to say the daily prayer of the Octave in private and to unite his prayer with that of the entire church.

These words were expressed by the Rev. E. Leo McMannus, moderator of the Rochester Diocesan Council of the National Council of Catholic Women, at a panel and discussion on Family Life and Parent Education recently in St. Mary's Hall, Canandaigua.

FATHER McMANNUS, professor of St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester, stressed the importance of good example which he said must begin in the home. The program attracted a large number of area residents including husbands and wives from Geneva and surrounding communities.

The panel featured several speakers and was sponsored by the Family Life and Parent Education Committee of the Ontario - Seneca - Yates Deaneary Council of the NCCW. Mrs. Frank Lyke of Manchester is chairman of the deaneary committee on Family Life.

The chairman presented objectives of the committee as follows: 1. Stress the importance of preparation for marriage. 2. Build vital family life on the spiritual, educational, and recreational levels. 3.
