

'Diary Of Anne Frank' Listed At Mercy High

The Diary of Anne Frank will be brought to the stage at Our Lady of Mercy High School, Friday and Saturday evenings, Feb. 10 and 11. This three-act drama selected for the annual school play at Mercy, will be directed by Sister Mary Pius.

The play is the story of a German Jewish family who sought refuge from Hitler in Holland and hid for 2 1/2 years in an attic above a factory be-

fore they were discovered. An account of those years was kept by Anne, a young teenage girl. The play was dramatized by Frances Goodrich and Albert Hackett from the best-seller, Anne Frank: Diary of a Young Girl.

SEVERAL ROLES in the Mercy version have been double cast. Portraying the impetuous and affectionate Anne will be sophomore Kathy Ashenburg. Junior Joanne Hargather is her understudy.

Others in the cast include Terry Vigna as Anne's sister, Margot; Daniella Petrucci as Mrs. Frank; Susan Kennedy as Mrs. Van Daan, "an older woman who has never grown up"; and Linda Hallen as Miep, the shield and lifeline of the families.

Understudies are Margaret Mary Garvey, Anne Marie Scutiere, Diane Schneider and Sue Timmons.

THE MALE cast from McQuaid Jesuit High School and John Fisher College includes Greg Maier and Dean McMullen as Peter; Bernie Puglisi as Mr. Frank; Don Coolidge and Dan Lang as Mr. Van Daan; Ben Madigan and Dave Zomerli as Mr. Dussel; and Frank Larson as Mr. Krater.

The back stage crew is headed by production manager, Sue Klingler, president of Theatians, Mercy's dramatic club. General manager is Marian Mullen, and director's assistants are Molly Walsh and Wendy Lesniak.

Co-chairmen of the set committee are Joanne Weichbrodt and Sue Henry. Other chairmen are Margaret Blum, props; Wendy Hall, lights; Pat Shannon, sound; Elaine Fantillo, make-up; and Barbara Eismont, wardrobe.

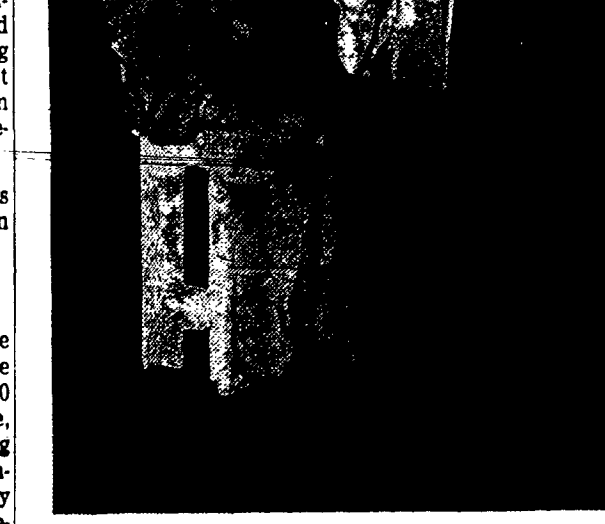

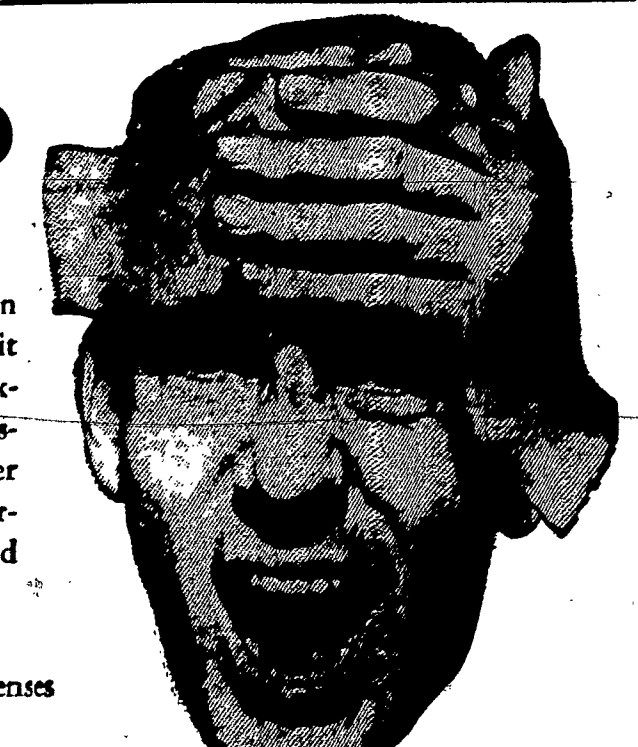
