In his talk on "Highway Safety and Accident Prevention" Corp. Willie broke down the letter Safety and emphasized the most important letter "E".
The following essentials for better driving are derived from that letter, he said.
No. 1. Engineering, which takes in the condition and outlay of the roads and how the individual maintains his vehicle.
No. 2. Education of the driver as to how to handle and operate a vehicle under any and all conditions.
No. 3. Ego, the preparation of yourself toward the correction of any bad habits you have formed while driving.
No. 4. Enforcement, the reaction of the individual when confronted with an accident — his cooperation with law enforcement officers. There are three sides to an accident, your side, the other individual involved and the facts.
No. 5. Elements, driving should not be done when conditions of the driver, roads and weather do not warrant it.

"We should do away with thoughtless driving that is: passing on curves, passing on knolls, going through stop signs, etc. We should drive only when we are physically and mentally alert," Corp. Willie said.

Point out that the friendships he possesses, not the least of which is your own, are endangered by his language. Assure him that you and the other girls regard him as a Christian gentleman.
That this esteem has high value he will know. That he does not wish to lose it is most certainly the fact. But, face him with this danger. It is possible he has never given it a serious thought.
