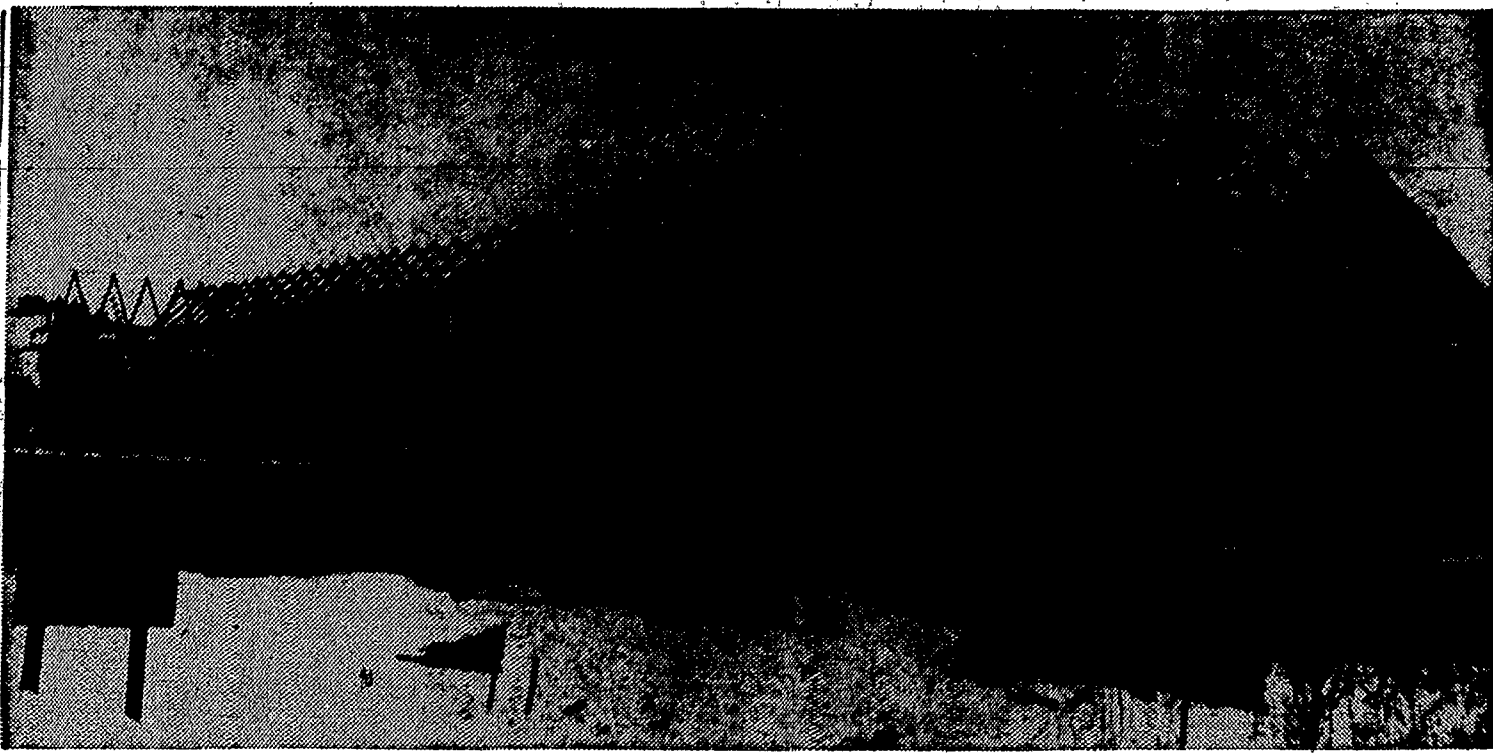

68 Nurses To Be Capped, St. Mary's Largest Class

Capping exercises for the largest class of student nurses in the history of St. Mary's Hospital School of Nursing will be held in Sts. Peter and Paul Church on Sunday, Feb. 19, at 3:30 p.m.

Sister Maria, Director of Nursing, named sixty-eight freshmen eligible to receive the St. Mary's cap in traditional ceremonies.

BISHOP KEARNEY will preside.

Reception of the cap signifies an official recognition of status as a student of the nursing profession. It represents assumption of obligations as a Catholic nurse in the tradition of the Daughters of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul.

The Class of 1963 will gather at the foot of the altar where Bishop Kearney will bless their caps. Each freshman will carry a candle, symbol of her dedication to nursing, which will be lit from the candle of an upperclassman. Sister Teresa, hospital administrator, and Sister Maria will confer the caps.

The cap that is worn by St. Mary's nurses today was adopted by the Sisters of Charity for all their schools of nursing. Blue stripes are added to the sides as the students progress in rank. Graduates of the school wear a narrow black velvet band around the cap.

EIGHT MEMBERS of the present School of Nursing Faculty are also graduates of St. Mary's. The faculty will participate in capping exercises.

The School of Nursing of St. Mary's Hospital was founded in 1892. Present enrollment in its three-year diploma program is 151 students.

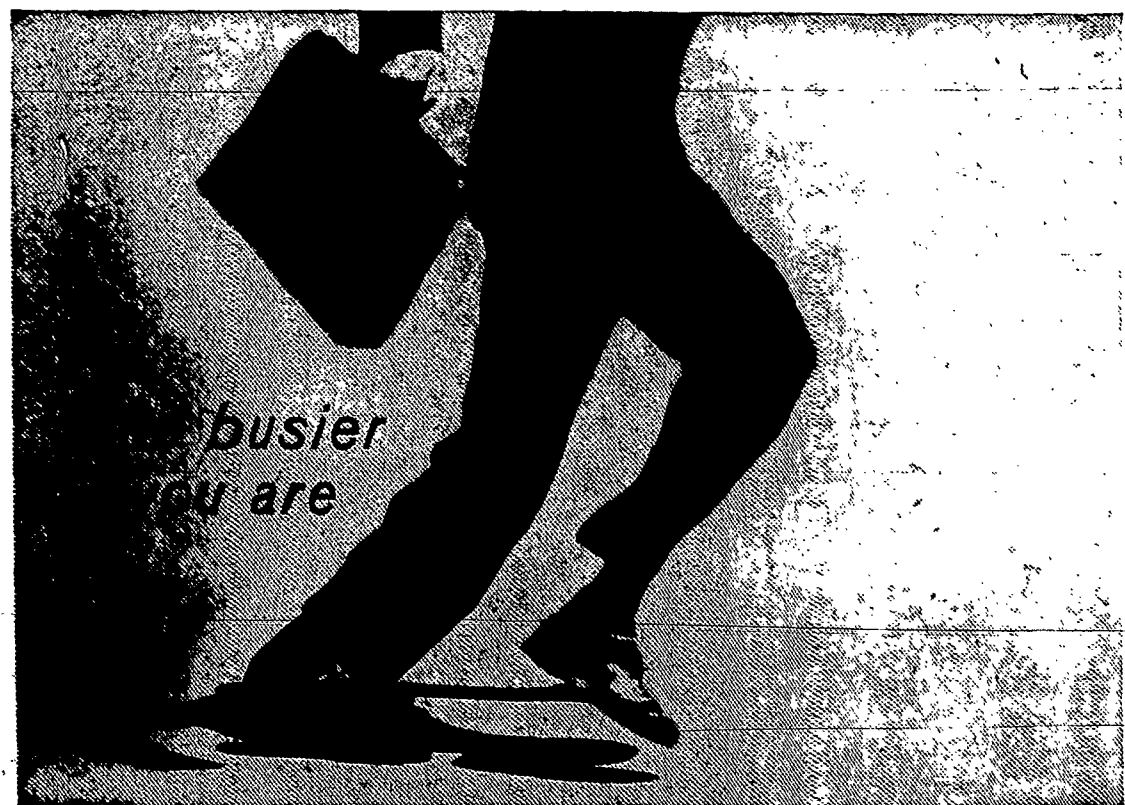

Karen Reimer Named Easter Seal Child

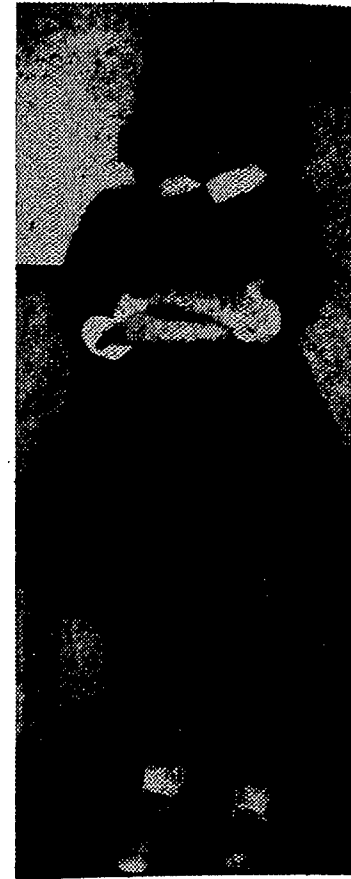
Karen Reimer was named Easter Seal Child of the Crippled Children's Society of Monroe County, it was announced this week.
