

### Cana Session Listed At St. James Hall

"In the Christian life, Marriage is not just a contract or an institution, but a Sacrament which unites the man and woman in a most intimate way with God, to participate in His work of world."

This will be the theme of the conference for married couples of St. James Parish to be conducted Sunday, Feb. 26, at the Church Hall, beginning at 1:30 p.m.

THESE LECTURES are known throughout the nation as Cana Conferences, after the first miracle of Jesus Christ which was performed at a

marriage feast in the town of Cana in Galilee. They are designed to explain the truths which underlie the vocation of marriage, and to inspire the couples with a deeper understanding and appreciation of their dignity as husband and wife and parents.

The lectures will be given by Rev. Gerald Dunn of St. Monica's Church and will treat topics such as the meaning of love and happiness, the roots of joy or dissatisfaction in the family, the qualities of a holy and peaceful home and marriage, and the various aspects of God's interest and influence in the marriage vocation.

The Conference will end with the renewal of the marriage vows together, and Benediction.

A native of Rochester, she attended St. Joseph's School.

Also surviving are another son, Orville F. of Rochester; three grandchildren, five great-grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

A familiar sight in the NBA is the presence of Boston and St. Louis as division leaders. This year is no exception as the Celtics and Hawks have commanding leads. Boston, in addition to a strong first five, have the league's best reserves. Frank Ramsey is termed basketball's best sixth man and Sam Jones has won plenty of games in his starting role. The St. Louis Hawks' tremendous front line of Hagans, Pettit, and Lovelette has been given plenty of help from Len Wilkens, a backcourt rookie from Providence. Wilkens, a lefty, has blossomed into an all-round cager and ap-

pears on his way to making a niche for himself in the NBA. THE SYRACUSE NATS meet the Philadelphia Warriors (Feb. 18) in the War Memorial. It gives Rochesterians their first chance to see Wilt Chamberlain in action. He is currently leading the NBA in scoring and is averaging 27 rebounds a game.

Dayton's big and rugged Flyers move into the final leg of its schedule with a 13-6 record. Junior Gary Roggenbuck (8-5), a rebounder of note, is averaging 17 points a game. Lending assistance are alternate centers Bill Westerkamp (6-10) and Pat Allen. Backcourt whizzes Bill Gramsby and Tom Hutton are averaging 12.4 and 10.3 points respectively. The Flyers, with hopes of attaining a post season tournament berth, has scored wins over such teams as St. Joe's, Xavier... Seton Hall is well known to Rochester sports fans.

General Mills offers a \$1,500 scholarship to the first ranking girl in each state and a \$500 scholarship to the state's second ranking participant.

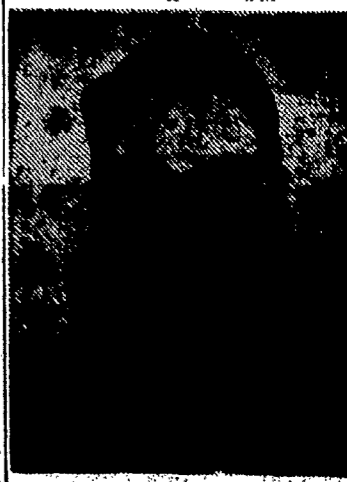
