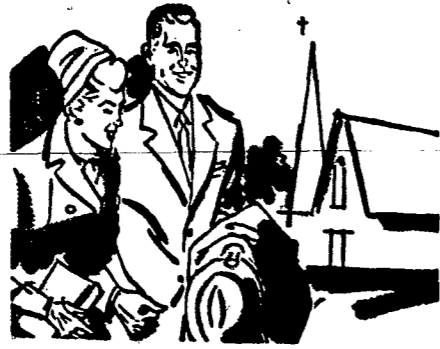


### Canisius Honors
