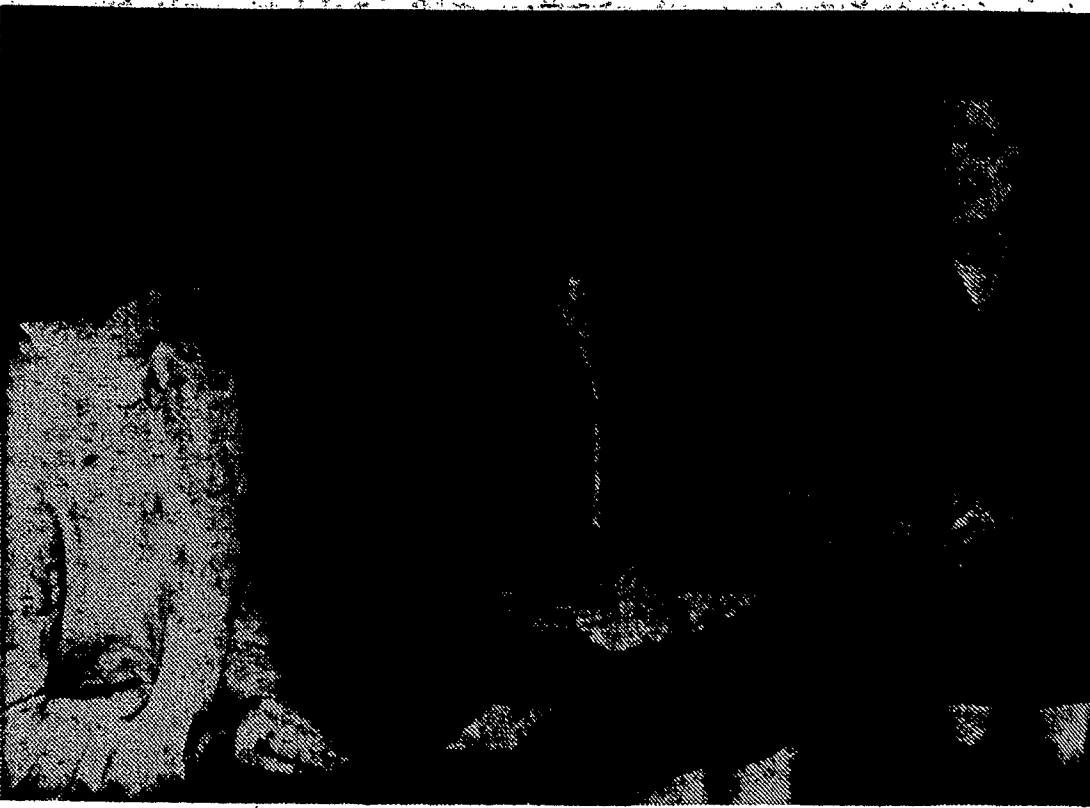

## St. Cecilia's Day

The practice of celebrating "good old songs." Anyway, St. Cecilia's festival, which is Nov. 22, was long established by 1736. In this year, George Frederick Handel composed his first Cecilia Ode. In 1739 he composed a second which was along.

Leonard Bernstein and the New York Philharmonic orchestra have recorded this rather extravagant work by Handel on Columbia records, with Adele Addison, Soprano, John McCollum, Tenor and Rutgers University Choir. As far back as 1683 a group of musical connoisseurs organized elaborate annual concerts in which the greatest poets and musicians participated.

Some of the oldies dug up for this album are "Side By Side," "My Melancholy Baby," "Last Night on the Back Porch," "Beautiful Ohio," "The Trail Of The Lonesome Pine," "I Love My Baby," "Wagon Wheels," "That's My Weak-ness Now," "Yes, We Have No Bananas," "Indiana," "The Prisoner's Song," "If You Knew Sute," "Anniversary Song," "Collegiate," "Alabama Bound," and "Where Do You Work, John."

The success of these sing-along albums which consists of a chorus of singers singing the good old songs perfectly straight without any fancy arrangement, proves that no matter what is written in the way of new music, new arrangements, new instrumentation, there will always be a flicker of love in everyone's heart for those "good old songs." P o e m s in praise of the patron Saint of music were written by such poets as Dryden, Shadwell, Congreve and Pope. These poems were then set to music by such composers as Purcell, Draghi and Handel. To my knowledge this is the first and only recording of this "Ode For St. Cecilia's Day" by George Frederick Handel.

Leonard Bernstein, already a unique figure in the annals of American music, has given us a clean, brisk, delicate but forceful performance in the true Handel tradition. The clear bell-like voice of Adele Addison is especially pleasing as is the mellow quality of tenor John McCollum. The Rutgers University Choir directed by F. Austin Walter (as fine a chorus as you'll find anywhere) adds just the right choral ingredient.

I GUESS THERE'S always room for one more "Sing Along." Mitch is at it again and this one's called "Happy Times Sing Along With Mitch." It seems incredible that after ten albums, Mitch hasn't run out.

The programs, designed to assist viewers in taking the spiritual inventory associated with Lent, will be broadcast from 10:30 to 11 a.m. It is carried on WJVE-TV, Channel 10 in Rochester.

The theme of the series, said the producers in a statement, is that man's spiritual growth begins in an acknowledgment of his limitations; thrives on honest self-knowledge and finds its expression in prayer.

The title of the individual programs are: "The Beginning," "The Opening Mind," "Living in the Present," and "The Path to Prayer."

The scripts were prepared by John Alcorn, author, TV personality and onetime member of the Harvard University faculty.
