

Cage Tourney Weekend

AQUINAS (7-10) opens its defense of the Diocesan Tournament Saturday against McQuaid at the War Memorial. The Little Irish, with 2 consecutive wins over the Knights, pin their hopes on Rog LaForce, a strong rebounder and a pair of juniors — Jim Chaterton and Gary Page.

High scoring Frank Zona and the outstanding backcourt duo of Tom Tisa and Richie Ide spearheaded McQuaid to a 12-5 regular season record. In their final warm-up for the big encounter the Knights thrashed West 66-52.

This game, now a classic, could very well turn out to be the best. The favored Knights will be up against a big and determined Aquinas team that was "sky-high" for the first two contests.

NIAGARA smashed St. Bonaventure, the nation's No. 2 club, in an amazing 87-77 upset. They did it in the Bona "execution chamber," the notorious O'Leary Armory, where the mighty Brown Indians had conquered 99 straight enemies. The Purple Eagles, inspired by the brilliant long-range shooting of Al Butler turned back two strong rallies to gain the win.

It was the biggest upset of this year and it marked "Taps" Gallagher's greatest win as the Niagara coach.

The Eagles beat Bona at their own game — the fast break; they routed the press and crashed the boards with authority. Butler netted 25 points including 11 of 19 from the field and had plenty of help from the talented soph, Joe Maddrey and Ken Glenn, who combined for 45 points.

ST. JOHN FISHER'S posted its second straight victory by nipping St. Michael's of Toronto 71-67. The Cardinals, held to a 25-25 half time deadlock, finished strong to nab the win. Ed Wandtke and Fred Hale combined for 37 points to lead the winners.

THE UR cagers stretched their record to 15-4 as they defeated arch-rival Hobart 87-59. The Yellowjackets spoiled Hobart's hopes with a 55-point spurge in the second half after being held to a three point lead at intermission. Junior Mike Berger canned 33 to pace the UR attack.

At the business meeting reports were given on the bake sale held in Feb. by its chairman, Mrs. Michael Mancini.

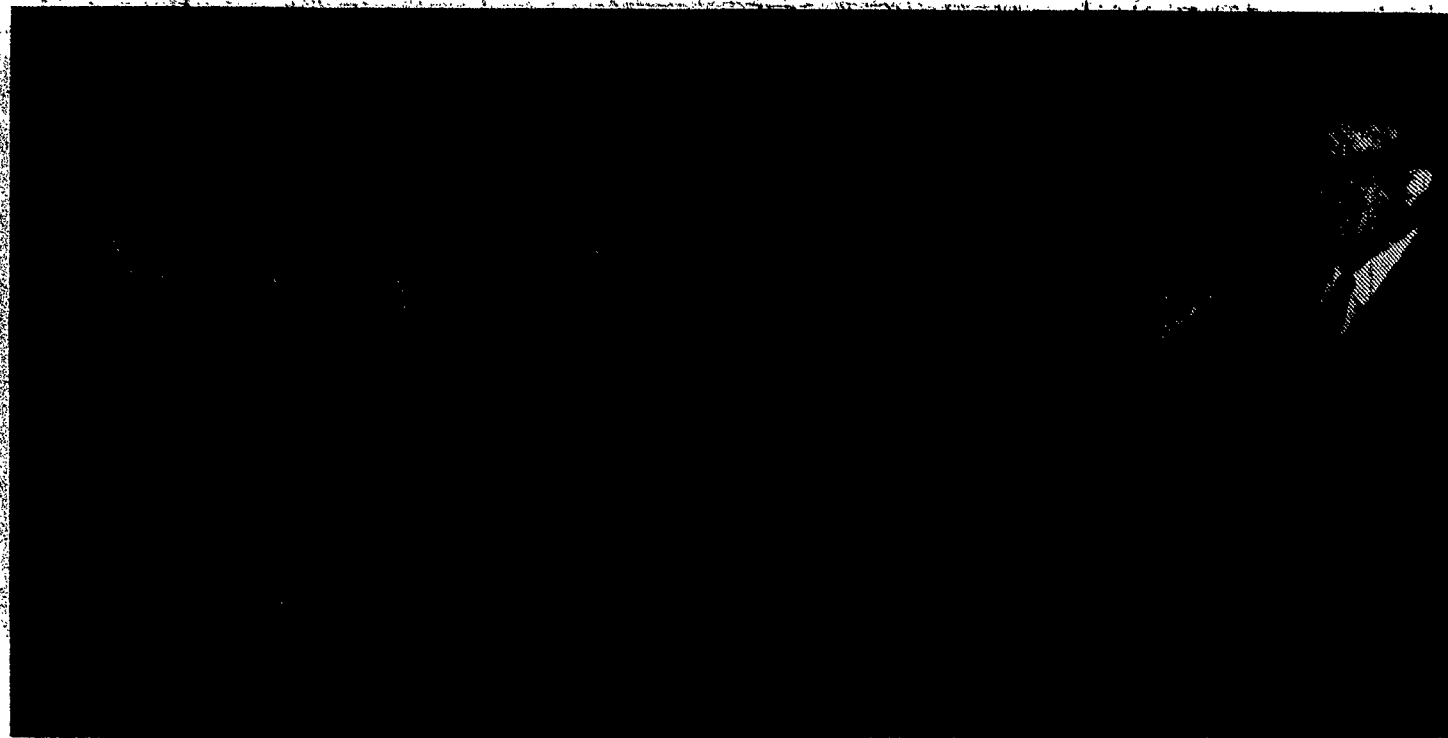
