

Career Night In Geneva

Geneva — Academic and physical requirements for candidates for the various professions were underscored by four speakers at the second annual "Career Night" program in St. Francis de Sales School recently.

More than 150 students from both De Sales High School and Geneva High School were present for the program which was dedicated this year to the Rev. Daniel Torney, assistant at St. Francis de Sales parish.

THE DEDICATION which was included on the program stated: "As a token of our affection and appreciation, we respectfully dedicate this program to Father Torney. No one could take a deeper or more active or more intelligent interest in the youth of our parish than he has taken. This dedication is made in gratitude to him for all his labor and sacrifice in behalf of the young people of St. Francis de Sales parish."

The Career Night program was sponsored jointly by the Holy Name Society and Rosary Society of St. Francis de Sales parish. It was staged for the benefit of all high school students and the ninth graders of Junior School.

THE PROGRAM was preceded by a roast beef dinner served by members of the Holy Name Society.

Opening prayer was given by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Edward K. Ball, pastor of St. Francis de Sales Church. The Rev. Lawrence V. Murphy, assistant pastor of St. John the Evangelist Church, Geneva, was toastmaster. Benediction was pronounced by the Rev. Anthony J. Valente.

Five young men from St. John's parish in Greece were guests at the dinner.

John Hastings of the Holy Name Society and Mrs. John Cooney of the Rosary Society were co-chairmen on arrangements for the Career Night, as-

isted by a committee from both organizations.
