Moscow—(RNS)—Two young painters from Alma-Ata, Kazakhstan, were sharply rebuked by the official organ of the Soviet Ministry of Culture for "combining civil service jobs with religious activity."

The magazine, Soviet Culture, said the artists—Vladimir Vasilev and Victor Emeljanov—were employed as cartoonists on a local satirical publication, but spent time at home painting religious ikons.

"The most disgusting fact is," the magazine said, "that they were given an education on the state's money — an education which they used for selfish purposes."

Church, State Separation Topic Of Hornell Talk

Hornell — Mutual respect is the basis for the separation of church and state in America, the Rev. Raymond Kenny, professor of American history at St. Andrew's Seminary in Rochester, told a First Saturday luncheon group.

FATHER KENNY, a native of Auburn, was principal speaker at the luncheon sponsored by the Steuben Deanery, Diocesan Council of Catholic Women, in honor of Our Lady of Fatima. There were 60 women at the luncheon which was held in the Knights of Columbus clubhouse. The luncheon was preceded by a Mass at 11 a.m. in St. Ann's Church celebrated by the Rev. William H. Hickey, Steuben Deanery spiritual director.

Speaking of the harmony which should exist between church and state, Father Kenny said: "We American Catholics know that the state, or government, has a right to our complete loyalty. Christ has told

us as much when he answered the question, 'Is it lawful to give tribute to Caesar?' by the words, 'Render, therefore, to Caesar the things that are Caesar's and to God the things that are God's.'"

Christ further emphasized the relation between religious and civil authority when he recognized Pilate's authority but reminded him that it was given to him from above," Father Kenny continued.

"We live in a pluralistic society today. There is, however, a place for all of us. Separation of church and state must be based, as it is in our country today, on mutual respect. The state recognizes the supremacy of conscience. The individual has the responsibility to refuse his conscience from time to time by serious reflection and meditation.

"OUR FOUNDING FATHERS left us a good country. It is not perfect—human leadership always can be improved. As American Catholics we must do all in our power to contribute to that improvement," Father Kenny concluded.

He was introduced to the group by the Rev. William H. Hickey, spiritual director of the Steuben Deanery. Mrs. Raymond Moretti, Deanery president, extended an invitation to all Catholic women in the area to attend a Deanery meeting on March 18 in the Pine Room of St. Ann's School. Films will be shown on a typical Retreat at the Cenacle in Rochester.
