

Education Talk Given To DeSales Parents

Geneva—There is a "tremendous task ahead" in the field of education and there will be more demand on the individual and the schools.

Dr. Edward R. Cuony, principal of Junior School, emphasized this fact at a meeting of the De Sales High School Parent-Teacher Association, recently in the school auditorium. His subject was "Modern Trends in Education."

WILLIAM DOUGHERTY, president of De Sales PTA, opened the meeting and introduced the speaker, Sister Rose Adelaide, principal of the school, spoke briefly.

Parents met with the faculty preceding the program.

Discussing the educational changes which have come about, Dr. Cuony said that education is "on the spot" today. He asked for the cooperation of parents and teachers in the school programs.

More demand is being made upon the student today, he said, and they must work harder. More material is being crammed into the courses and the content itself is more difficult. He said that high school population has doubled since 1910 and the prediction is that college enrollment will be considerably higher in the future.

CITING STATISTICS, the speaker noted that manual labor may be replaced with automation in the future, and unskilled labor will be reduced because society will be requiring more education.

Dr. Cuony said that when he was in Ohio last summer, he spent two days looking over the teaching machines, overhead

projectors, electronic class rooms. They are only teaching aids, he said, and will never replace the teacher.

The schools are doing a good job, he stated, and the ideal of our nation is to educate as many as possible. It will not be easy, he advised, but the challenge is exciting.

8 Parishes Report Gains

Sectional meetings will be devoted to the following topics: junior-high school typewriting; the business education curriculum; higher education; abbreviated longhand systems; business arithmetic; and distribution education.

Other Rochesterians taking part in the meetings include: Ray L. Clippinger, Consultant in Business Education, Rochester Public Schools, president of the association; Harmon Bulley, member of the panel on junior high typewriting; John Ertle, recorder for the panel on Business Arithmetic.

McQuaid Takes Crown

McQuaid captured its first Diocesan Basketball championship last Sunday defeating Notre Dame of Elmira 62-49 before a capacity crowd of 1800 fans at Ritter-Clark gym. McQuaid's Knights and Notre Dame battled on even terms through the first period with the score tied at 13-13 at the first quarter mark. McQuaid jumped to an early lead in the second quarter by buckets by Frank Zona and Tony Criscuolo with the aid of free throws by Dick Ide, 19-13. Notre Dame never threatened again until the last quarter when they closed the margin to nine points. McQuaid's superior height, excellent ball handling and timely shooting made the difference.

Richie Ide was high man for the Knights followed by Frank Zona's 13 and Tony Criscuolo's 12 as McQuaid displayed a well rounded attack. For Elmira Justice McCarthy netted 12 points and Bernie Harosek and Jim Ramich both contributing 10 points apiece.

In the consolation game De Sales of Geneva defeated Aquinas 77-70 for third place honors. Roger La Force took scoring honors with 20 points for the Little Irish who couldn't quite overcome the De Sales attack. Gary Page grabbed 18 points to help the Aquinas cause. De Sales broke from a 17-17 first period deadlock to take a 36-30 half time edge. At the third quarter mark De Sales was still in command 51-47. This marks the first time in tournament history Aquinas failed to win a game.

General Chairman William Meyers and the committee wish to express their appreciation for all those who help make this a record year in attendance at both the War Memorial (6782) and R.I.T. (1836). Howard Meath and Mark Touhey Jr. were both recognized as major contributors to this successful tournament.

St. Agnes High Honor Society

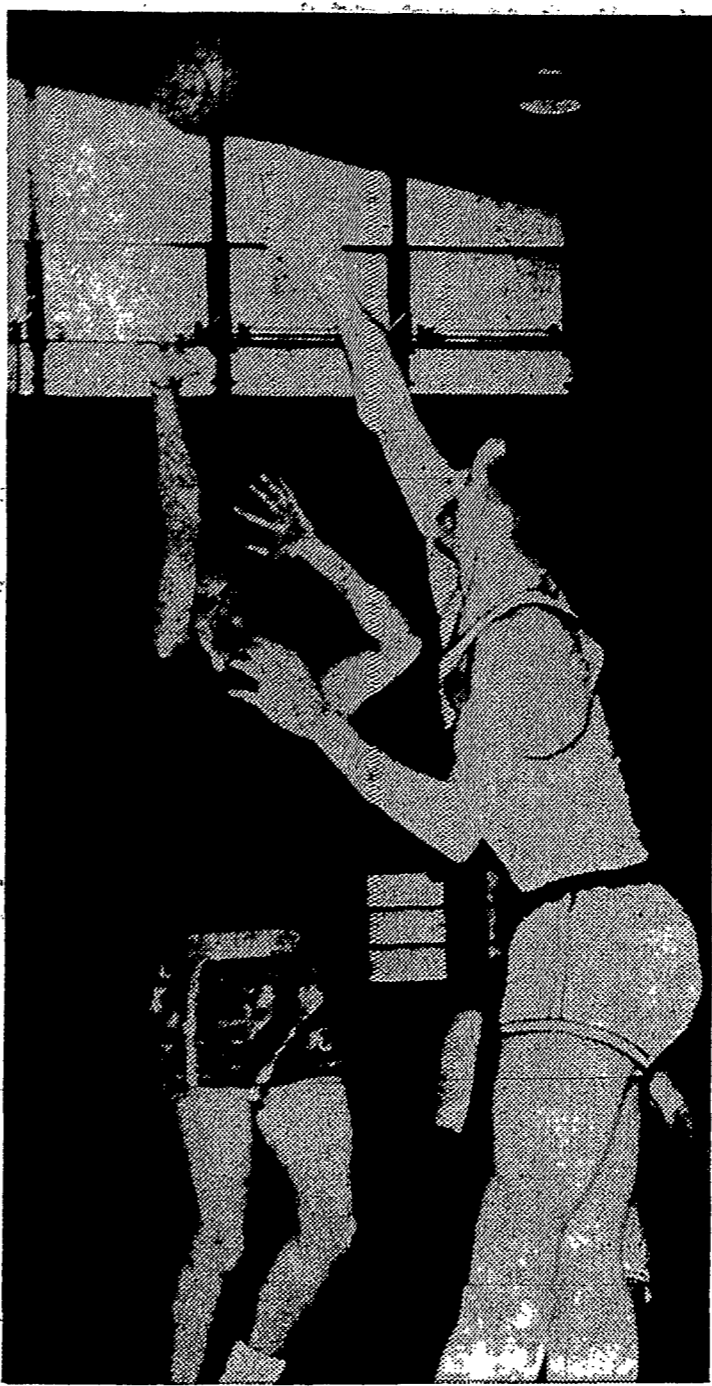
St. Agnes High School was chartered as a member of the newly organized National Business Honor Society during the past week.
