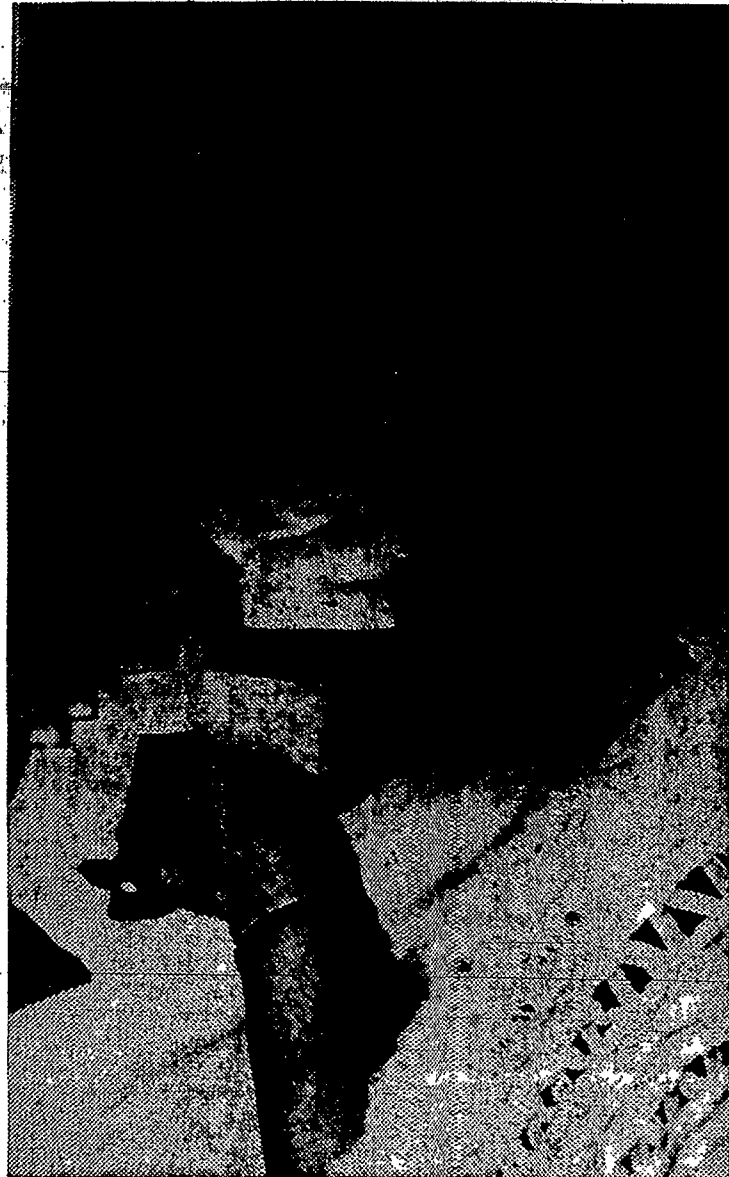


New Therapy Program At St. Ann's Home



While the structure of the wide variety of activities, both new St. Ann's Home on Port-land Avenue is progressing up-ward, so also is the more inter-nal program of services to the residents of the Home. Within the past year, medical, food and laundry services have been modernized insofar as possible well-being of the individual at the Lake Avenue address, guest.

ONE YEAR AGO, a profes-sionally trained occupational therapist, Miss Arlene F. Pal-damer, was added to the staff for the purpose of developing a therapeutic and general ac-tivities program, and designing this department accordingly. A growth of the program.

As knowledge of this program has reached individuals in and about the city, a group of women have joined together to build an organized St. Ann's Home Auxiliary. They have seen through the success of occa-sional programs sponsored by individual groups in the city, the need for expansion of a volunteer service program which would augment the activi-ties and general service needs at St. Ann's Home.

THE GUESTS OF the Home are not only interested in this new project, but are currently discussing with Miss Palmer the role of this Auxiliary, and ways in which they feel the members of the Auxiliary can help them.

In fact, many of the service needs of the Home are already being met by the guests themselves who, at the average age of 88, are most able, capable and willing "volunteers."

They read and write letters for those who cannot see, they sew on buttons and fix hems for those whose hands are crippled with arthritis; bring records and music to people in the infirmary; share in making tray favors and party decorations not only for St. Ann's, but also for other Homes in the city; they crochet and sew dressings to be sent to those persons afflicted with leprosy; prepare and wrap dressings for one of our own city hospitals; gather and collect clothing, eye glasses and other needed materials for missions.

THERE ARE STILL, however, many of the 227 persons in the Home not being reached, and who, with a minimal amount of assistance could find a real sense of satisfaction, accomplishment and worthwhile purpose in these continuing years.

Deadline for signing up is Saturday, April 1. Those interested may call the C.Y.O. office, BA. 5-2707 for further details, and application blanks.

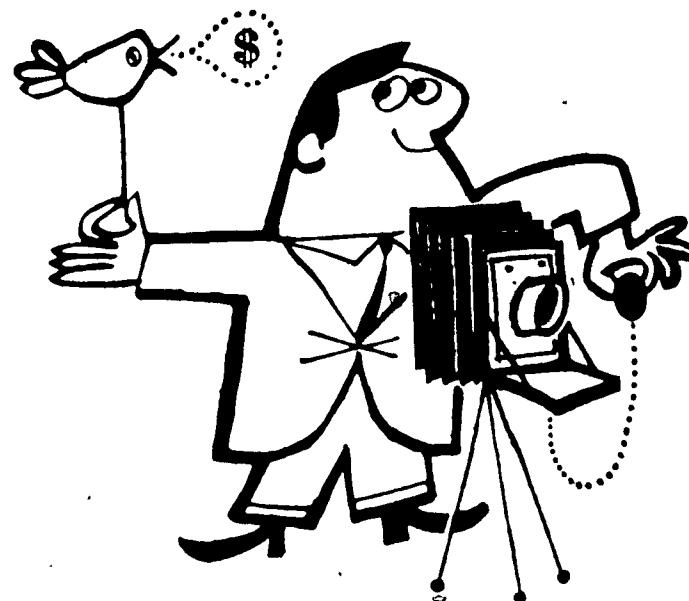
**Peters Honored
