

## St. Joseph Nun Awarded Grant

Sister M. Bonaventure Cornelia, S.S.J., graduate of Nazareth College and a member of the Nazareth Academy faculty, was awarded this week one of the prized Woodrow Wilson Fellowships for prospective college teachers.

THE FELLOWSHIPS, awarded annually by the Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation, cover the first year of graduate study and are meant to encourage the newly elected fellows to consider college teaching as a career. Sister Bonaventure will attend Fordham University next fall for study toward a doctoral degree in English.

Three other members of the Sisters of St. Joseph received honorable mention awards from the foundation. They are: Sister M. Juana Minton, a senior at Nazareth College; Sister M. Joan Rowan, an instructor at St. Agnes High School and Sister M. Josanna Kane, an eighth grade teacher at Our Lady of Lourdes school in Rochester, both graduates of Nazareth College.

All four of these Sisters are junior religious who earned their bachelor degrees during their juniorate.

Sister Bonaventure is one of 1,333 students from 381 colleges and universities who were named Woodrow Wilson Fellows for 1961-1962. Nominations for these highly competitive awards are made by the students' professors. Screening of candidates also is done by 15 regional committees drawn from the academic profession.

A 1954 GRADUATE of Nazareth Academy where she was president of the National Honor Society. Sister Bonaventure has received several other scholastic awards and distinctions. In 1954, she won both New York State Regents and Nazareth College scholarships and in 1959, a New York State Regents College Teaching Scholarship.

She entered the Sisters of St. Joseph in September 1954 as a postulant. In 1959 she received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Nazareth College, graduating magna cum laude in English. She has been a teacher at Nazareth Academy since that time.

Sister Bonaventure is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Guy Cornelia, 75 Ridge Port Circle. At the time she entered the Sisters of St. Joseph, she was a member of Holy Rosary parish.

## Fr. Loughlin Dead At 44 In Arizona

The Rev. James V. Loughlin, 44, a former Rochesterian, stationed in Alabama and Texas since his ordination in 1943, was stricken with a fatal stroke Friday (March 10, 1961) in Flagstaff, Ariz.

Father Loughlin on special assignment in Flagstaff, died in a Phoenix hospital.

He attended St. John the Evangelist's School and St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries and was ordained in Mobile, Ala.

FOR THE LAST two years, Father Loughlin was an assistant pastor in Blessed Sacrament Church at El Paso, Tex.

He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Loughlin. The elder Loughlin was a Stromberg-Carlson Co. employee. The family's home was on Marion Street.

Father Loughlin is survived by a sister, Sister Mary Thomas Loughlin, stationed in St. James Mercy Hospital at Hornell. The funeral service and burial were in Albuquerque, N.M.

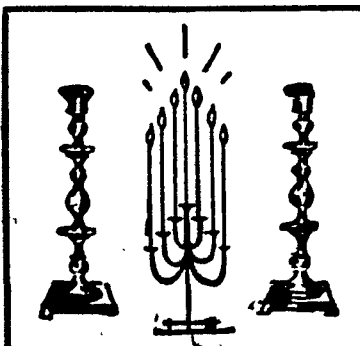
## Holy Hour For Youth

## Special Help Needed For Foster Children

An enlargement on its program of finding foster homes for children was announced this week by the Diocesan Catholic Family Center in Rochester.

There are a number of sick children entrusted to the Center who need short-term periods of convalescence not available in their own homes. For various reasons—broken homes, other family illness or financial difficulties—it is best for the child to spend the "getting well" time with other than his own family. This is usually a period of two to four months.

OTHER CHILDREN need a very special care. These are youngsters who are emotionally immature, often due to lack of love or attention in their own homes. This particular care takes a longer time than for those who suffer from a physical ailment. The period of convalescence is usually between 1 and 2 years.

Another category of need is that of the child who has a chronic disability. Some are permanent bed patients, others are ambulatory but suffering from polio, multiple sclerosis, India,
