Tournament Opens Tonight

Holy Cross and St. Monica's were crowned league champions this past week from results of their respective playoffs. Holy Cross started it off by dumping Sacred Heart 79-63 and then came back to skunk Mother of Sorrows 57-51 in overtime to grab the title. In the playoff for second spot in High School Northern Division, Mother of Sorrows stopped Sacred Heart 63-48. Holy Cross will represent the first place team and Mother of Sorrows the second place team in the City Northern division.

In the high school Southern division St. Monica's mustangs took two wins. On Friday they stopped Blessed Sacrament 51-37 to tie for the league title and then came back on Sunday to defeat St. Helen's for their third championship in a row 40-36. Holy Ghost rounded out the schedule with a 71-59 rout of Blessed Sacrament for third place spot. Hats off to this fine Holy Ghost club, who last year finished near the bottom and this year grabbed third place and lost only to St. Helen's by a point. St. Monica's will represent the Southern Division first place team and St. Helen's the second place entry in the tournament.

SPEAKING OF this tournament which starts tonight at the CYO Auditorium with a triple-header scheduled starting at 6:30 p.m., let me give you basketball lovers an idea who's who in the grammar school journey there are two divisions, green and white.
