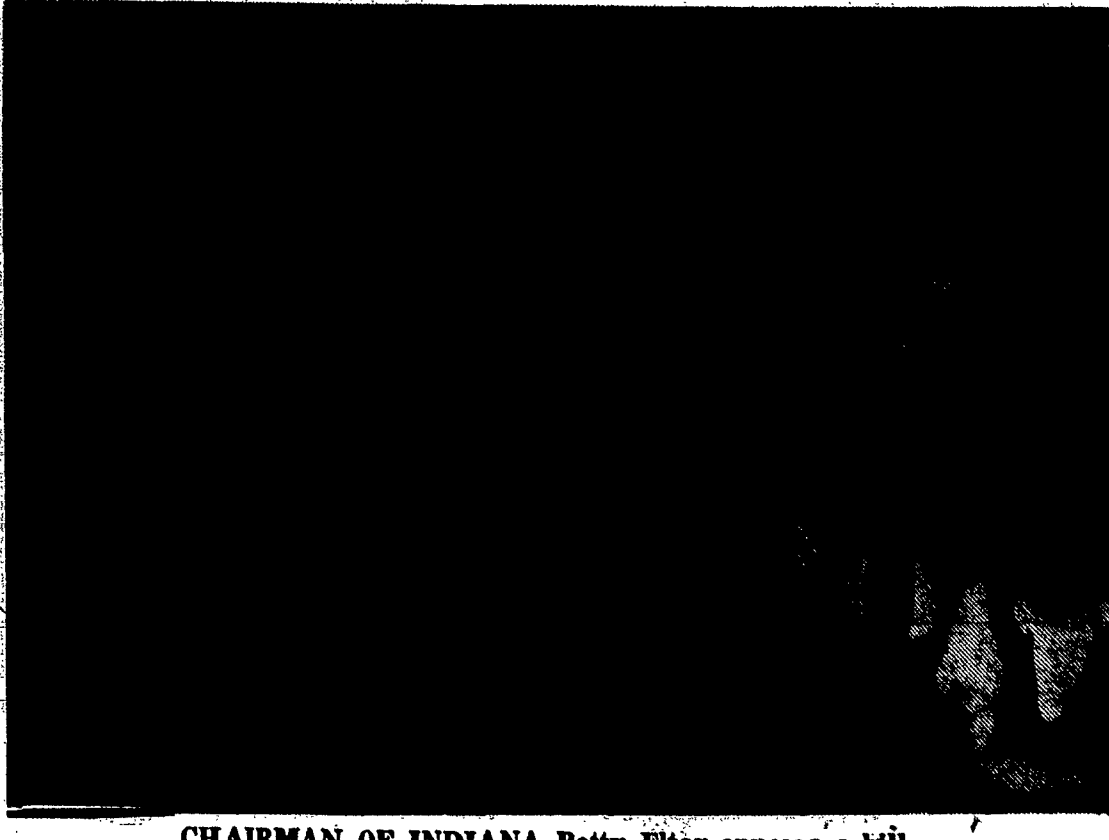

St. Rita's 'Congress' Meets

"The delegate is out of order" and "the Chair recognizes the chairman of the North Carolina delegation" were familiar phrases at St. Rita's School last Monday.

Paul McEneaney, the Speaker of the House, called the assembled seventh and eighth graders to order and directed the discussion and voting. Paul's administrative duties were lightened through the efforts of Marilyn Fuller, secretary, and Michael Rees, clerk.

THE OCCASION was the second meeting of St. Rita's Student Congress. Early in the school year it was decided that the best way to learn is by doing. So these boys and girls undertook the portrayal of members of Congress.

In November they met in committees and considered bills submitted by their members. Nineteen of these bills were reported out of committee and were considered by the Student House of Representatives.

In an effort to achieve reality each student was assigned to a state delegation. Votes were apportioned according to a three to one ratio making a total of four hundred thirty-seven.

The bills on the calendar were read, defended, debated and finally put to a vote. The legislation ranged from the condition of our foreign relations to the need for a revised State University.

Thomas Tylter proposed a bridge across Irondequoit Bay. A revised farm program was urged by Marjorie Meyer and Barbara Icone asked the delegates to commit the United States to a promise to suspend nuclear testing.

PRIOR TO THE actual meeting, chairmen of the delegations met and traded promises to vote for favored pieces of legislation. The activity was particularly great in the case of the chairmen of the larger delegations.

Judy Anderson headed the Pennsylvania delegation, Timothy Smith led the California delegation, Michael Jeary polled the New York delegation and Robert Steinorth spoke for the delegates from Texas.

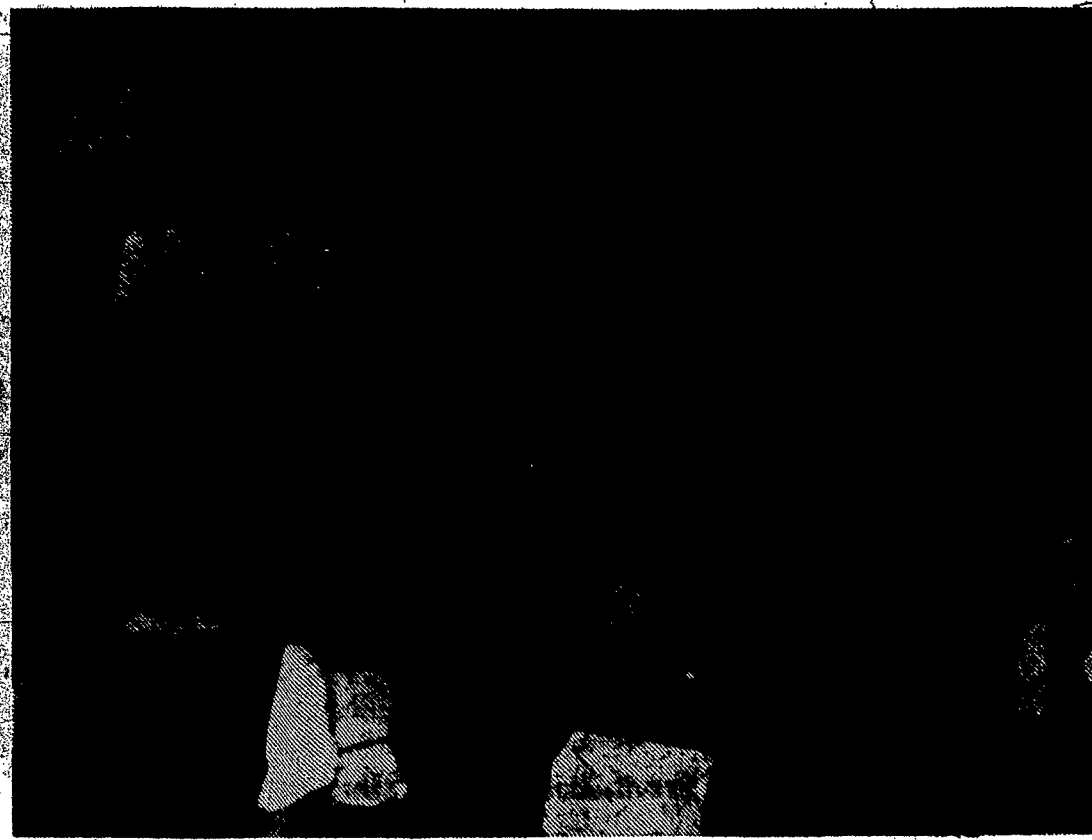
One hundred of the representatives will be given senatorial states and meet some time during the first week of April. At that time they will debate and vote on the bills passed by the House. In spite of the brevity of their congressional careers, it is the conviction of all that this activity has been informative.

Insurance and personnel work; public relations; library work; and work in a public service agency will be described by four speakers.

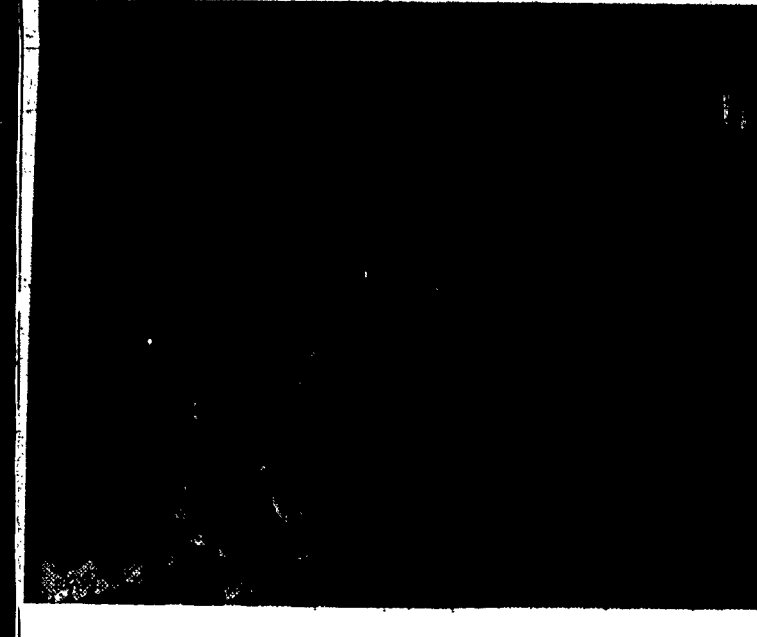
MISS JEAN DALTON, representative of the nation-wide All State Insurance Company, will describe her duties in personnel and insurance work with this large organization.
