## Holy Name Pin Tourney Deadline Set March 30

Only seven days remain for Catholic bowlers to file entries for the 1961 Holy Name tournament.

Reserve entries are due by tomorrow, March 25 and final entry deadline is midnight, Thursday, March 30, with Bowling Congress and under the competition slated to get the auspices of the Catholic under way at the Empire Lanes Men's Bowling Assn. 2404 Thurston Blvd. (on Route 104 East) on Saturday, April 22.

Tournament officials are hopeful that a record entry will complete in the five-man event, which is scheduled for 23 consecutive days at the Webster alleys. Their optimism is based on the high number of early reservations. The tourney is second only to the New York State Bowling Assn. tournament, statewide, in both entries and prizes.

The Holy Name tournament, as usual will be conducted on a handicap basis. The highest average in ANY LEAGUE LAST YEAR will be used with scratch average being 950 pins. Handicap is based on 70 per cent of the difference between the team average and that figure. A bowler who has no previous season average shall report his present season highest average for 12 or more games, otherwise must accept the scratch average of 190 pins.

NO TEAM over the 950 average may enter. Entrants may bowl only once. Teams or individuals presently bowling in unaffiliated leagues are not eligible.
