Wilfred Nadeau Last Rites Held

Bath — Wilfred C. Nadeau, 53, principal of Haverling Junior-Senior High School for 21 years and a leading local Catholic lay leader, died Friday, March 17, 1961, at Rochester Memorial Hospital.

Mr. Nadeau, active in community, education and church affairs, was first president of the St. Mary's parish Men's Club, treasurer of the Bishop's Catholic Lay Committee on Boy Scouting, and is a past president of the Rotary Club.

REQUIEM MASS was offered Tuesday morning in St. Mary's Church, with burial in Ticonderoga.

Mr. Nadeau, a resident of 80 Geneva St., was prominent in Steuben County educational and inter-scholastic athletic activities. He joined the Haverling faculty 30 years ago and was elevated to the position of junior-senior principal in the fall of 1942.

He was a veteran of World War 2.

He is survived by his widow, his mother, now of Ticonderoga; three brothers, Edmond and Norman Nadeau of Ticonderoga, and John of Schenectady; a sister, Mrs. Arthur De Lorne of Ticonderoga, and several nieces and nephews.

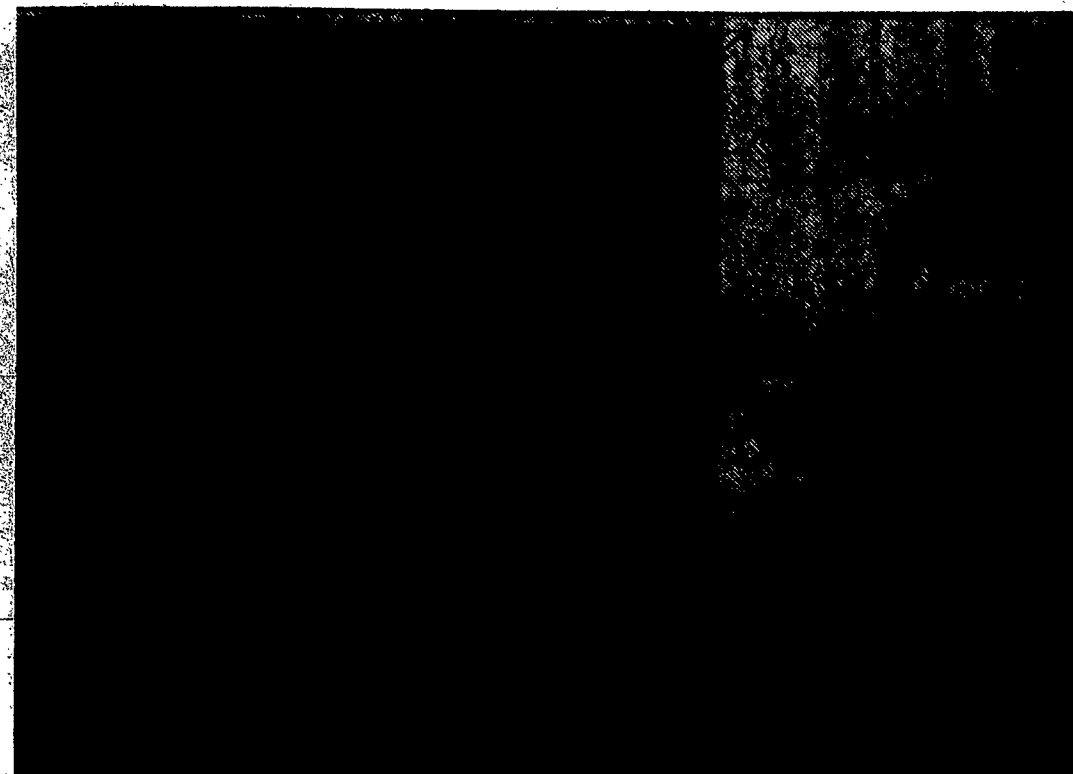

It is seven years since a rookie has broken into the Detroit Tigers lineup.

This season there may be a pair of rookies in the lineup on opening day. The newcomers are Steve Boros, a sure starter at third base and Jake Woods, who currently has an edge in competition for the keystone position.

The movement directed towards a youth transfusion has stemmed from the fact that there are several promising new faces and also since Detroit was hit hard in the draft (Dave Sisler and Eddie Yost were the first two draft choices.)

Boros has been very impressive in the minors. Last season he hit .317 at Denver and belted 30 homers. At the conclusion of the season he was voted the MVP in the American Association.

The Tigers traded away their regular second baseman and hence the position is open. Wood, considered quite fast, is receiving his main competition from Chuck Cottier.

Larry Osborne, a hefty first baseman and pitcher Joe Grezenda are two more rookies getting a long "long look-see."
