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### At Our House . . .

### Happy Easter!

After three unsuccessful "leads" for this column, the Head of the House, knowing that a "lead" is like meat for a meal or guests for a party, offered to help. He came up with "an original, hitherto unpublished poem"—whose title is longer than the verse!

Entitled "Easter Is Here" it goes like this:

"Lent Went"

More truth than poetry!

By the time this column is read Holy Week will be over—or almost over—depending on whether you receive your paper in the mail on Friday or pick it up at church on Sunday.

HOLY WEEK — peak of the Church's liturgical year.

Thanks to the revision of the liturgy of Holy Week established in 1956, the people are enabled more closely to participate in the ceremonies of the Church in this the most important season. Beside it, Christmas is secondary.

Fortunately, in spite of efforts to commercialize — to whip up a second annual "spend-all" period — Holy Week retains its essentially religious character. This is reflected at your house and at ours, in all families throughout the Christian world.

This last intensification starts, of course, with Palm Sunday — now more correctly known as the Second Sunday of Passiontide, with attention concentrated on the Passion of Our Lord. The palms are significant of Christ's entry into Jerusalem hailing His Kingship. That is why, after the procession in church, the family might well have a procession throughout all the rooms of the house, the father asking God to bless all the places to which these palms have been brought, and into which a woven cross of palms is placed.

At our house, the Head of the House likes to play "The Palms" on that day, with everybody joining in. Though we know not the words, the tune is great.

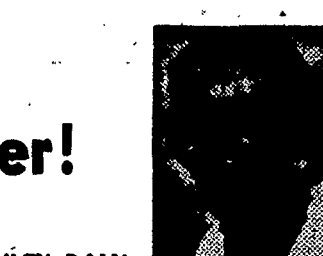
THE FIRST few days of Holy Week, we try to get cleaning out of the way, give unused clothing to those in need. Indeed, we wish that the Bishops' Relief would have a second clothing drive now when, if you'll pardon the expression, income taxes are coming up and we have more clothing than cash.

Then Holy Thursday, "Ubi Caritas" Day, one of fraternal charity when in reverence for the institution of the Holy Eucharist and of the priesthood, family members can practice extraordinary kindness and consideration within the home. Following the parish Mass on this evening, all grown-up members of the family have taken part in the service, comes Holy Thursday feast at home, symbolic of the Last Supper. A sense of Ubi Caritas prevails: "Where charity and love abide, there is God."

On Good Friday, our homes reflect the somberness of the day. Children, even the smallest, will perceive that this is a day set apart. Quietness, a willing, cooperative quietness prevails when meditation on the Passion of Christ is uppermost.

Meals are purposely the simplest of the entire year, with perhaps a reading from the Passion preceding dinner. In many families, as in ours, this is "Hot Cross Buns" day — the only dessert. The Good Friday service in church is an inspiring experience including as it does the reading of the Passion, the prayers for the intention of the Church, veneration of the Cross and, since 1956, reception of Holy Communion.

HOLY SATURDAY, now becoming known as "Great Saturday" comes, with preparation for the Easter vigil and for Easter itself. Everything at home is still subdued, but preparation for the Great Feast continues. Comes Easter egg dyeing, and a remembrance of the egg as a symbol of the Resurrection, decorating the eggs with Christian signs such as the chi rho, candles, a lamb.

Easter vigil service, with the rite of Baptism administered to recent converts is an electrifying spiritual experience for those who can attend. Unfortunately, in many localities, this experience is limited for many because of the size of the church.

But there are the Easter Masses for those who can't squeeze in for the vigil, and for those who want to attend still another Mass on Easter.

Then comes the "dress-ups" — frilly Easter bonnets, spanking white gloves, the hunt for Easter eggs for children, first at their own home, then at Grandpa's. It's a relaxed, family day, a very special occasion, a truly religious feast.
