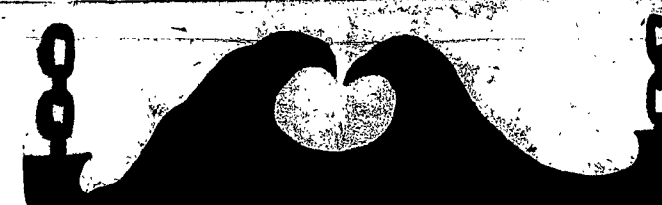

19 Given Nurses' Caps In Hornell Ceremony

Hornell — Pain, misunderstood by man, has an unseen beauty fully recognized only by the Creator Who permits it, the Rev. John P. O'Malley, pastor of St. Mary's Church in Bath, told member of the Class of 1963 of St. James Mercy Hospital at capping exercises Sunday.

NINETEEN STUDENTS received their caps signifying the completion of their probationary period in the school of nursing at symbolic ceremonies in St. Ignatius Loyola Church.

They were presented by the Rev. William H. Hickey, chaplain of St. James Mercy Hospital, who welcomed the large number of relatives and friends and expressed the students' appreciation to God, to the medical and nursing staff and all who had helped them attain the first big step towards their vocation.

Speaking to the students and the group, Father O'Malley said: "There must be infinite value in pain since Christ not only took up His cross but embraced it. Man, on the other hand, runs from pain and pursues pleasure which, if carried to excess, results in more pain. Lack of moderation in food or drink, for example, can bring mental and bodily distress. Pain in itself, however, is shunned because the world cannot see its purpose."

FATHER O'MALLEY described the nursing vocation, which is so closely associated with the portion of humanity suffering from pain, as so special as to require certain qualifications. He continued:

"The first essential for a good nurse is compassion. Not a proud aristocratic pity, but the beautiful, humble quality as exemplified by Christ who had compassion for the multitude. If a nurse has suffered herself, it should give her a greater understanding of others in pain."

Cheerfulness, the second qualification, can transform a sick room to a place of warmth and comfort. Father O'Malley warned against "the long-faced nurse who enters the hospital room armed with a hypodermic needle as if she were looking for a target."

The third qualification, that of seeing value in the invisible, means that the nurse must

realize that if her patient were the only individual on earth, Christ still would have suffered and died for his soul, Father O'Malley said.

After Father Hickey blessed the caps, each student approached the sanctuary to exchange her "probie" beanie for the starched cap of her profession. Sister Mary Valerian, director of the school of nursing, placed the cap on the student's head, assisted by Sister Mary Thomas, supervisor of surgical nursing.

EACH STUDENT was given a miniature Florence Nightingale lamp, enkindled from a larger lamp by Sister M. Elizabeth Anne of the nursing school faculty who later led the famed Nightingale pledge to "maintain and elevate the standards" of the nursing profession.

Solemn Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament concluded the ceremony with the Rev. Bernard G. Newcomb, pastor of St. Cecilia's Church in Rochester as celebrant; the Rev. Joseph P. Haffey, pastor of St. Ignatius Loyola as deacon; Father Hickey, sub-deacon and the Rev. Charles Langworthy, assistant pastor of St. Ignatius, assisting priest.

MUSIC FOR the capping exercises was by St. Ignatius Loyola Male Choir with William Loree as organist-director. In the sanctuary were the Rev. Charles A. Schey, guidance counselor of Notre Dame High School in Batavia, and the Rev.
