Contest Set In Auburn

The 24th Annual American Legion National Regional No. 2 Oratorical Contest will be held at the Auburn Community College, Franklin Street, Auburn, on Monday, April 10, at 10 a.m. It will be under the direction of the National American Commission of the American Legion, National Headquarters, Indianapolis.

The four winners of the recent State Finals in the States of New York, Rhode Island, Connecticut and New Jersey will participate in this contest, and the winner will then compete in the National Sectional "A" Contest, which is sched-

uled to be held in Washington, D.C., on April 17.

Winners of the National Sectional Contests will then compete in the National Finals in East Hartford, Conn., on April 20.

The winners in the National Finals will be awarded college scholarships, as follows: 1st Prize, \$4,000; 2nd Prize, \$2,500; 3rd Prize, \$1,000; 4th Prize, \$500.

The contest is centered around the Constitution of the United States. Because of the fact that this is the first time that the contest on the National level is being held in this area, the committee is desirous of having a good attendance by high school students and faculty, and members of The American Legion and their auxiliary, also the general public. There will not be any charge for admission.

Due to the limited seating capacity at the Auburn Community College auditorium, admission will be by ticket only. Tickets are available at any local American Legion Post.

Members of The American Legion, their auxiliary and other veterans organizations are requested to wear their caps.

The contest on April 20 will be in charge of Dr. William J. Burns, Albany, National Representative and Theo. A. Busch, Auburn, New York, Local Representative, National American Commission, the American Legion.

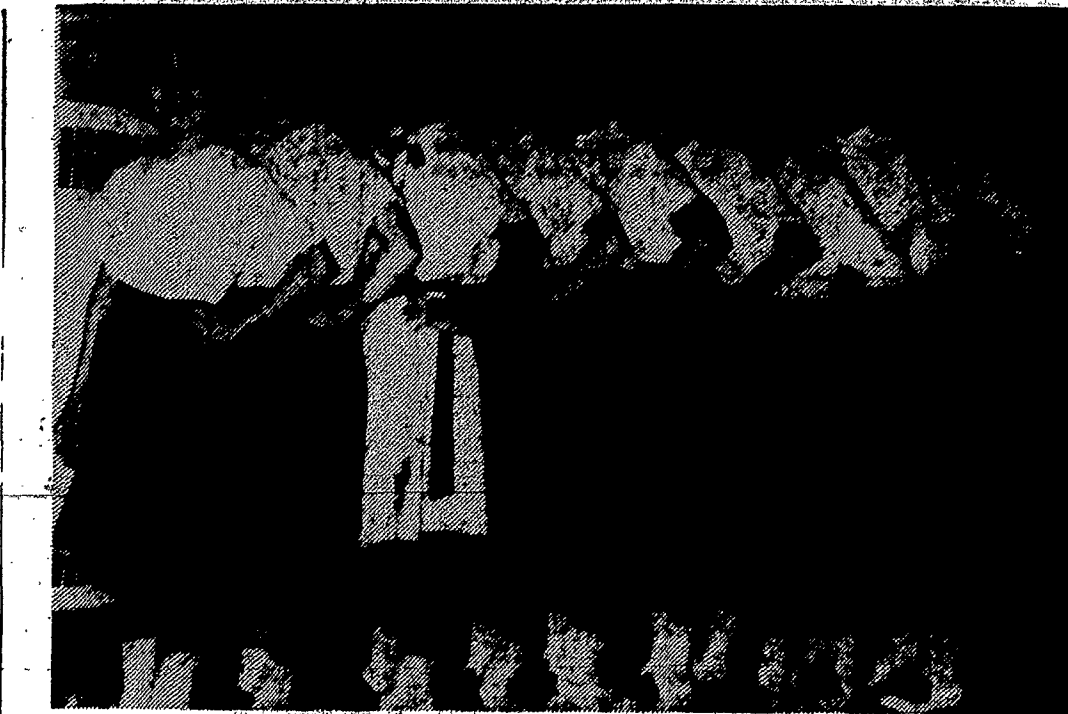
