Educational TV To Be Discussed

The possibility of Channel 13 for educational television will be the subject for discussion at a public meeting which will take place Friday, April 28 in the Auditorium of the Rundel Library Building.

The directors of the Rochester Area Educational Television Association have called this meeting to provide an opportunity to the people of the community to become better acquainted with the status of the efforts to secure this Channel.

THE DIRECTORS of RAETA represent a broad segment of the educational and cultural groups of the Rochester and Monroe County community. Harold Hacker is the present President of the association and among the members are the Rev. William Roche, Superintendent of the Catholic Schools of the Diocese of Rochester, and the Very Rev. Charles J. Lavery, C.S.B., President of St. John Fisher College who represent a group of the private institutions in the area.

The position of RAETA at the moment is that they are filing arguments with the Federal Communications Commission in Washington urging the Commission to allocate Channel 13 to the Rochester area and to reserve it exclusively for educational purposes. To secure this Channel, the local group must prove their financial ability to establish and operate a station.

The directors of RAETA hope to enlist public support so that sufficient capital will be provided to ensure the granting of the Channel.

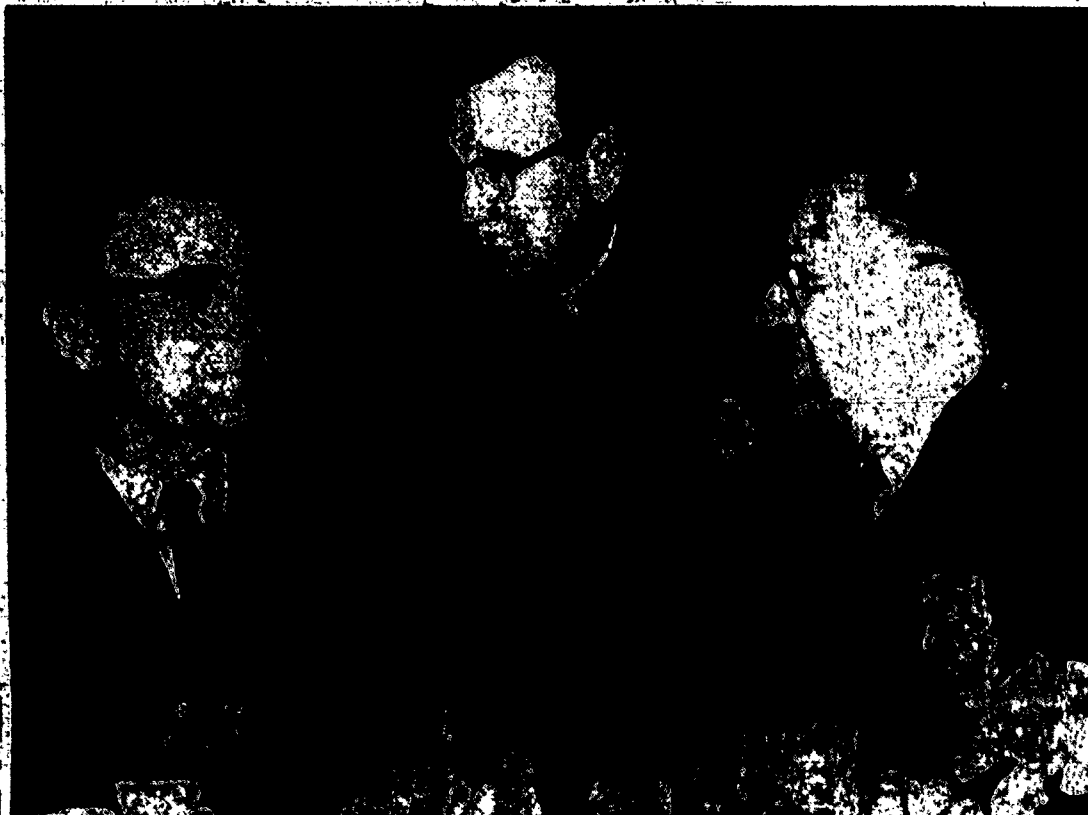
FATHER NOLAN issued a call last Sunday for volunteers to work on the campaign. Over 100 men have offered their services to work for their parish.
