## Bishop's Kin Recalls Vow

Boston, Mass. — (RNS) — A vow made by a Catholic prelate last July that he would never leave the Dominican Republic unless he was killed or expelled was recalled by his sister Boston after learning that Bishop Thomas F. Reilly was attacked by a terrorist mob.

MISS KATHLEEN REILLY, of this city who visited her brother at his home in San Juan de la Maguana, near the Haiti border, with her 86-year-old mother last summer, fears what may now happen to him. The bishop arrived in the island's capital, Ciudad Trujillo, after his residence was wrecked. Police and soldiers kept him in protective custody for a while and then released him.

"About all that was saved at my house were my sacred vestments," Bishop Reilly reported. Miss Reilly said she observed on her visit the people in her brother's parish "were 100 per cent with him" in his fight against persecution by followers of dictator Rafael Trujillo.

Trujillo has collected the scum of all the earth in his goon squads. All we can do is hope and pray," says Miss Reilly.

Her brother, consecrated five years ago, is 52 years old and has served in Dominican missions in the Caribbean since 1928.

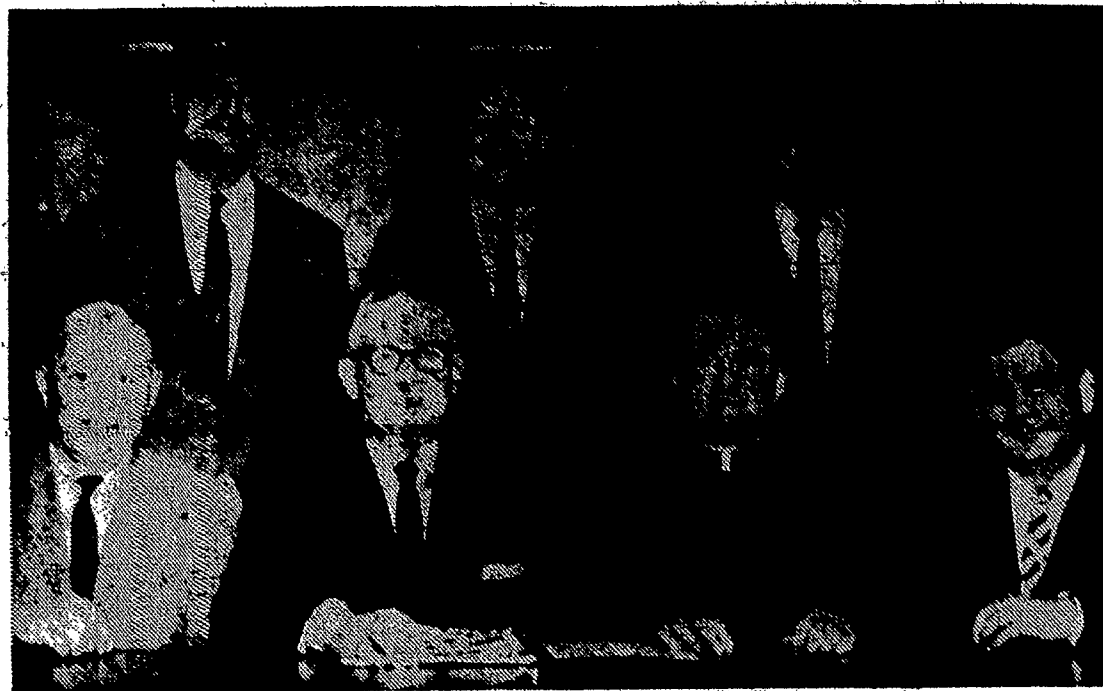

## Atonement Friars Make Foundation In England

London — (RNS) — A new link between British and American Catholics was forged here when Cardinal William Godfrey, Archbishop of Westminster, blessed the first English house of the Atonement Friars of the Atonement, whose motherhouse is at Graymoor, Garrison, N. Y.

THE NEW FRIARY, originally built as an orphanage for children of deceased British Army officers, is an Italian-style manor modeled after the Palazzo at Verona. It is located behind Westminster Cathedral on a street appropriately named Francis Street. Major responsibility of the Graymoor Friars, as they are popularly known, will be to run the Catholic Central Library at Westminster.

In the Diocese of Rochester, the Atonement Friars have charge of St. John's Atonement Seminary in Montour Falls near Elmira.

Cardinal Godfrey, who afterwards presided at a dedicatory Mass in Westminster Cathedral, was welcomed by Father Angelus Delahunt, S.A., Father General of the Graymoor Friars of the Atonement, who came especially from Graymoor for the occasion, along with other friars; Father Blaise Burniston, S.A., superior of the new community, at present consisting only of himself and three Brothers; and a large group of invited guests.

The guests included Massachusetts-born Mayor Robert L. Everett of Westminster, and his wife; and Arthur Fleischman, leading British Catholic sculptor who carved a bronze statue of St. Francis of Assisi which stands outside the friary, and a bust of Cardinal Godfrey is displayed inside. Also present were representatives of the Center on Sunday, April 23 at 2:30 p.m. Initiation will be held for ten new members, who will be introduced by the Grand Regent, Mrs. Charles Schrandt. Miss Helen Sullivan, District Deputy, will preside at the ceremony. The shrine of the Blessed Mother will be set up and decorated by Mrs. Russell Polizzi. Refreshments will be served by Mrs. Samuel Cammaro and her committee.

## Bishops Hit Birth Curb Movement

Hartford, Conn. — (RNS) — A move to repeal Connecticut's 80-year-old laws prohibiting the use and prescription of contraceptives has been opposed here by the heads of the states three Catholic dioceses.

In a statement read at a legislative hearing on two bills to repeal the laws, Archbishop Henry J. O'Brien of Hartford, Bishop Lawrence J. Shehan of Bridgeport and Bishop Vincent J. Hines of Norwich said it is unnecessary and inadvisable for state legislators to reargue the laws while a decision on their constitutionality is pending in the U.S. Supreme Court.

The Supreme Court has heard oral argument on an appeal by several Connecticut residents and is expected to announce its findings shortly.

The Connecticut prelates said they would not offer any evidence at the hearing here because they felt the issue "has been so thoroughly publicized that the members of the committee are familiar with the arguments which would be made by the advocates on either side of the question."

They added: "It is sufficient to say that the perennial position of the Roman Catholic Church on the fundamental moral question of the practice of contraception is unchanged and unchangeable."

Regarding the specific question of repeal of the laws by the state legislature, they said that their position "continues to be in opposition to repeal of these statutes."

## Youth Week

Vienna — (NC) — An expected 25,000 participants will make this year's Youth Week the largest gathering of Catholic young people ever organized in Austria. The series of discussion sessions, cultural events and entertainments will last from May 25 to June 1.

## Working Wife Trend Rising In Canada

Montreal — (NC) — Should newly married young women continue working outside the home?

Half of 45,000 young French Canadian couples planning to be married think they should, according to a survey conducted by the Young Catholic Workers (Jocists) and directors of the Marriage Preparation Course.

The survey was made over a one-year period and covered 300 parishes in 20 dioceses of Quebec, Ontario and New Brunswick.

The YCW, which is stressing the slogan "A home without a wife is a threatened home," warned that the working wife trend in Canada has been increasing.

THE ORGANIZATION stated that in 1950 working wives in Canada totaled 327,000 in 1955 the figure was 468,000 and in 1960 it had soared to 736,000. What economic reasons did the young couples interviewed cite for their stand that wives should work outside the home? The future husbands said payment of debts was a major reason, and the future brides were concerned about the purchase of a car and home.

How long should the wife continue to work? More than one year after marriage, said 42 per cent of the men surveyed and 37 per cent of the women. Furthermore, 34 per cent of the prospective husbands and 28 per cent of the prospective brides were not enthused about having a child in the first year of marriage.

THE YCW SAID that 60 per cent of the girls in Montreal who are engaged to be married have expressed a desire to hold their jobs after marriage.

"Does this not indicate a sort of pernicious anemia in the economic system, with a dangerous fever gripping feminine labor?" the organization asked.

The YCW is stressing the point that unless it is absolutely necessary for a wife to work, she poses a threat to happy home life because of the clash of interests in her role as a worker, mother and housewife.

## Anglican Envoy Arrives In Rome

Rome — (RNS) — Canon Bernard C. Pawley, of the Anglican Diocese of Ely, arrived here to represent the Church of England in Rome while preparations continue for the Second Vatican Council summoned by Pope John XXIII.

A FLUENT Italian speaker, Canon Pawley will serve as liaison between the Anglican Church's Council on Inter-Church Relations and the Secretariate for Christian Unity created by the Pope and headed by German-born Augustin Cardinal Bea.

The British churchman is expected to remain in Rome until September, when he will return to London to report to the Anglican Council.

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
