Her christening robe, pinafore for playtime, school and party dresses are all so carefully designed and made that they have a special "custom-jade" look all their own.

Ever since Alice in Wonderland, little girls have had a special affinity for pinafores and they love them to tie in back with a big butterfly bow. Attention is focussed on trimmings such as ruffles of Swiss embroidered eyelet, imported double lace edgings, all over Swiss embroidery and old-fashion beading with pull-through pastel ribbons.

And just when we've made the swing to all that's new in adult feminine fashion, up pop new features in little-girl fashions. The "Camelot" sleeve (a double sleeve), jabot French Val lace ruffles are just a few of the high fashion touches on dresses for real little ladies. Waistlines for both big and little girls are a point of major interest. Sometimes they're indicated with a wide sash or nar-

Collar and yoke treatments are as varied as little girls' personalities. Collars are scalloped, squared, doubled or tripled, ruffled or tailored, even petaled. Contrasting color or fabric, cut-out effects, welt-stitching, appliques... these characterize the interesting detail that make a big fashion on little girls.

Colors, too, are as varied in children's fashions as in adults'. When shopping for a special (not school) dress for a favorite little lady, you find such refreshing new shades as rose crystal, ice cream peach, Robin Hood green and silver blue. White, the most feminine color of all — at any and every age, — is not just dedicated to the treasured communion dresses. It is shown and seen in every group — playtime to party time.

An outstanding name in the field of girls' fashion is that of Celeste. Recently introducing a "little Deb" group, they have the typical Celeste quality features plus the more "sophisticated look." Sized 8 to 14, these dresses are proportioned differently from the big sister group, with waistline darted and tapered to give a more shapely appearance and the skirt lengths are slightly longer. Zippered closings are used and there is complete absence of baby trims. A unique separate marquisette petticoat, with hip peplums, rounds the hips and slenderizes the waist.

Celeste little couturier dresses are available in fine stores throughout the country. Sizes range from a tiny two to a flowering fourteen. The demure miss pictured, is wearing a little-girl gown of blue broadcloth from collar to hemline on either side of the vertically tucked organdy panel giving the effect of a coat dress. 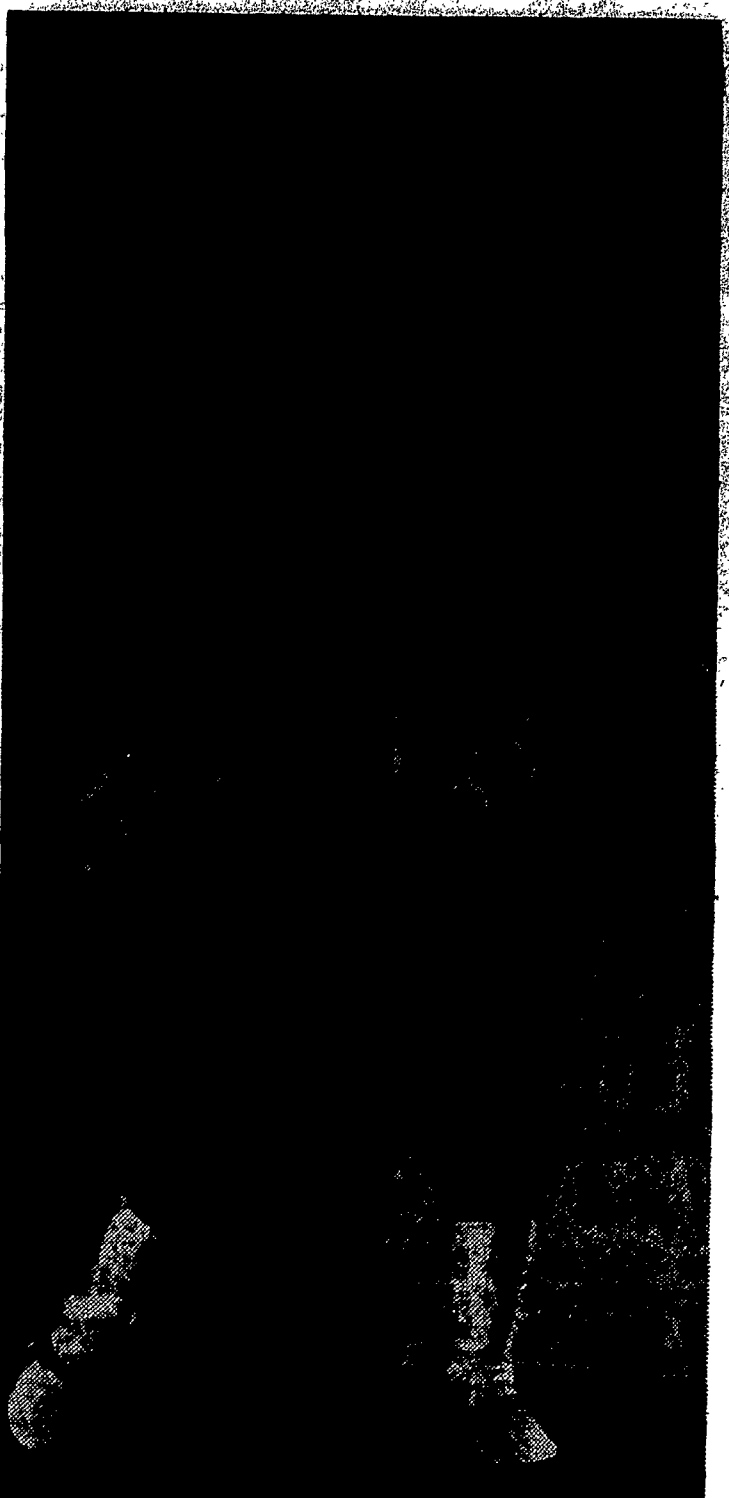
