

Veteran Mission Nun To Address Rosary Unit

Sister Rose of Lima, veteran Maryknoll missioner in both Korea and the Philippines will speak at the annual breakfast of St. Augustine Rosary Society, Sunday, May 7 in the school hall. Mass will be at 8 a.m. at which members will receive Holy Communion together.

A trained nurse and a pharmacist as well, Sister Rose of Lima spent 21 years in the Orient where she first went in 1931 and was stationed in North Korea.

During World War II, Sister was first in an internment camp for some time and then repatriated to the United States. She returned to Korea again in 1949, this time to Pusan in South Korea. In June 1950, she was forced to go to Japan when hostilities broke out in Korea.

After nine months, she was one of the first three Maryknoll Sisters to be flown back to Korea with a commission to care for the refugees who flooded the port city. They were the first civilian women permitted to return to Korea.

For four years she took a leading part in operating the Maryknoll Sisters' Clinic in Pusan, treating "the longest charity line in the world," as the Army newspapers termed it. Often 2,000 and more refugees came to the clinic for aid every day. The saga of this clinic's work has been published in Her Name Is Mercy by Sister Maria del Rey. Sister Rose of Lima did heroic work at this famous clinic.

In 1955, she was assigned to St. Joseph's Hospital in Manila, Negros, Philippine Island. Here the Maryknoll Sisters staff a hospital for sugar workers and their families. She has been there for the past four years, but returned to the

United States on leave-of-absence last year.

SISTER ROSE of Lima is the former Ann Robinson of St. Michael's parish in Jersey City, N.J. She is a graduate of Catholic University School of Nursing in Washington, D.C., and of Fordham University School of Pharmacy.

Mrs. Joseph Egan and Mrs. Arthur Farren are co-chairmen of the breakfast. Mrs. George Stewart and Mrs. Kenneth Hamilton are in charge of tickets. Mrs. Bud Messe has decorations.

Young Women Needed For Work Abroad

Washington — (NC) — An appeal for young women qualified for USO work overseas was made here by Thomas D. Hinton, executive director of the National Catholic Community Service, a USO member agency.

Mr. Hinton said the need is for young women aged 25 to 30 with college degrees and some experience in group work activities and volunteer recruiting and organization.

They are needed for professional staff assignment in PSO clubs overseas, the NCCS official said.

National Catholic Community Service is the agency of the U.S. Bishops which provides for the welfare of men and women in the armed forces and their dependents.

THE AGENCY conducts USO activities near major military installations in this country and maintains a staff in USO units around the world, including Tokyo, Rome, Manila, Guam, Okinawa, Istanbul, Casablanca, Naples, Paris and Athens.

"Almost half the members of the U.S. armed forces are outside this country at the present time, and a greater demand for USO services has been noted in recent months," Mr. Hinton said.

"A USO assignment overseas gives a young woman a special opportunity for a rich and rewarding personal service to Church and country," he added.

Two Notre Dame High School students in Elmira have been awarded National Science Foundation grants for summer study at Manhattan College.

Karl Ekes, son of Mr. and Mrs. Anthony M. Ekes of Hendy Hollow Road, and James Hall, son of Mr. and Mrs. James A. Hall of 106 Durland Avenue, will attend a six-week course in mathematics and physics beginning June 29.

The two students are the only upstate students among the 40 chosen by Manhattan College from 350 applicants.

THE FOUNDATION scholarships will cover tuition, books and supplies and all or part of travel expenses.

The scholarships for high school students are based on recommendations from the principal and teachers and on academic achievement over several years.

Both boys have chosen math and science as their principal field and have been active members of the science club.

India Priest Visits Germany

Bonn, Germany — (RNS) — Father Joseph Vadakkan, who organized the Indian Anti-Communist Front, is visiting West Germany at the invitation of the Bonn government.

THE INDIAN priest, editor of the Kerala Tempest, an English-language weekly, and of Thozhialai, a daily published in the Malayalam dialect, has developed an employment bureau, a housing corporation, a medical aid association and an industrial development committee under auspices of the Anti-Communist Front.

Since 1956, he has served as assistant director of the Malabar Missionary Brothers, who are active in the Kerala region of India.

A Communist defeat in the state elections of Kerala two years ago has been attributed largely to the activities of the Front organization.

Indian Tribe Adopts Bishop

Anadarko, Okla. — (RNS) — Bishop Victor J. Reed of Oklahoma City and Tulsa and Abbot Philip Berning, O.S.B., of St. Gregory's Abbey, Shawnee, Okla., were received as honorary members of the Caddo Indian tribe in ceremonies at St. Patrick's Indian Mission here.

IT WAS reported to be the first time the Caddos had "adopted" white men. More than 1,000 Indians of seven area tribes witnessed the ceremonies.

Bishop Reed was given the name Ha-dos Ha-Ka-Yu (White Dove), denoting his spiritual mission of dispensing the Holy Spirit. The bishop had administered the sacrament of Confirmation on a class of 85 mostly Indian children. Abbot Philip was named Ah Ah Hayu Nayt-Toomba Kan-in-nah (God's Interpreter).

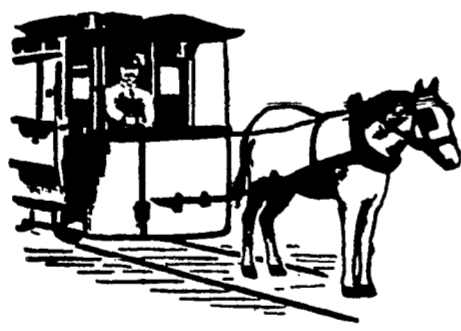
Highlights of the track season will be the Brighton Relays on May 20 which will pit Aquinas against 23 city and county schools. Aquinas placed second last year.
