

# Two Experts To Talk On Latin-America

Two nationally-known experts on Latin American affairs will conduct an all-day conference on the problems of the United States in that area this Friday (April 28) at Nazareth College of Rochester.

Dr. Richard Pattee of Université Laval, Quebec, Canada, and Dr. John Parr, Dean of the School of Foreign Service, Georgetown University, will lecture, answer questions and join in a general discussion of

Latin American problems during the day. Both lectures will be open to the public.

DR. PARR, who at one time was assistant director of the Office of International Relations of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, will discuss some of the problems of the United States in Latin America during a 10 a.m. lecture at the college.

Dr. Parr has been dean of

the Edmund A. Walsh School of Foreign Service at Georgetown since 1958. Before that he had been an assistant dean of the school, a Professor of American History and Literature at the University of Fribourg, Switzerland, and a professor on the staff of the University of Maryland Overseas program.

A graduate of Georgetown University (B.S. and M.A.) and the University of Fribourg (Ph.D.), Dr. Parr has authored two books: "Love Thy Neighbor" (jointly with Dr. Pattee) and "Theophile Delcasse."

At 2 p.m., Dr. Pattee, chairman of the Nazareth Latin-American conference, will speak on some of the problems facing the Catholic Church in Latin America.

BEFORE JOINING the faculty of Laval University, Dr. Pattee gained extensive experience in foreign affairs. He has served with the United States Department of State, the National Catholic Welfare Conference, as a consultant to the American delegation to the United Nations Conference in San Francisco, and as member of the Vatican Commission on UNESCO.

He received his B.A. at the University of Arizona and his M.A. at the Catholic University of America. He completed his graduate studies at the University of Louvain in Belgium and the University of Coimbra in Portugal.

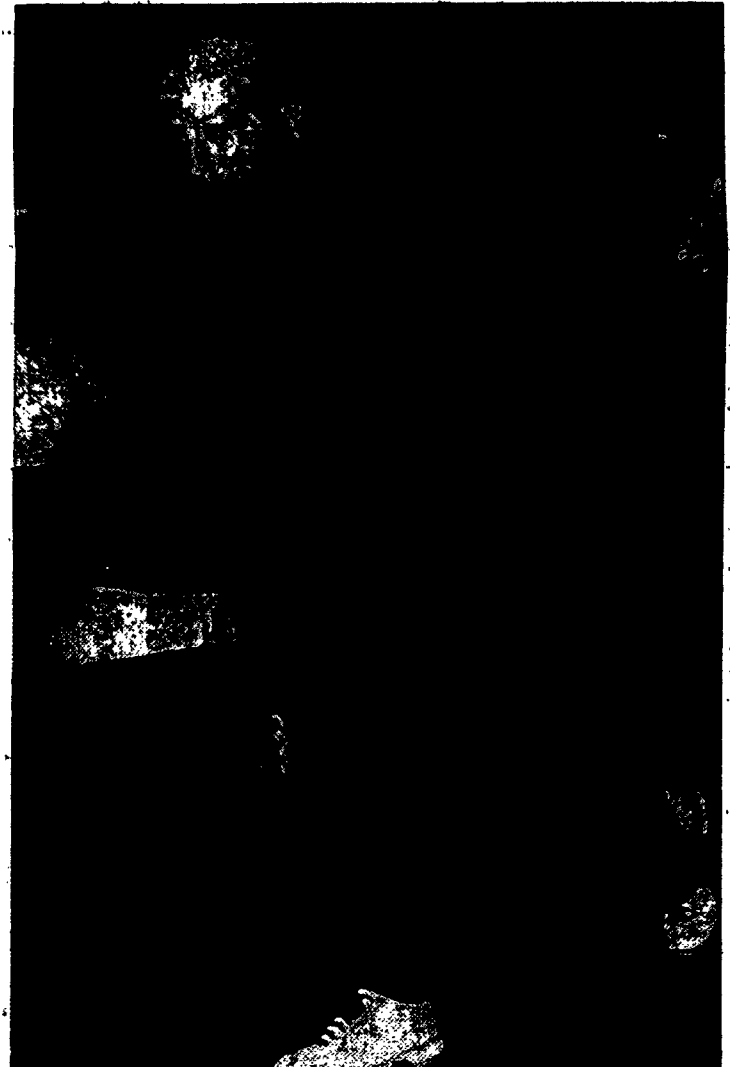
