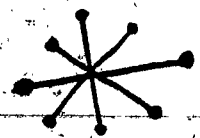

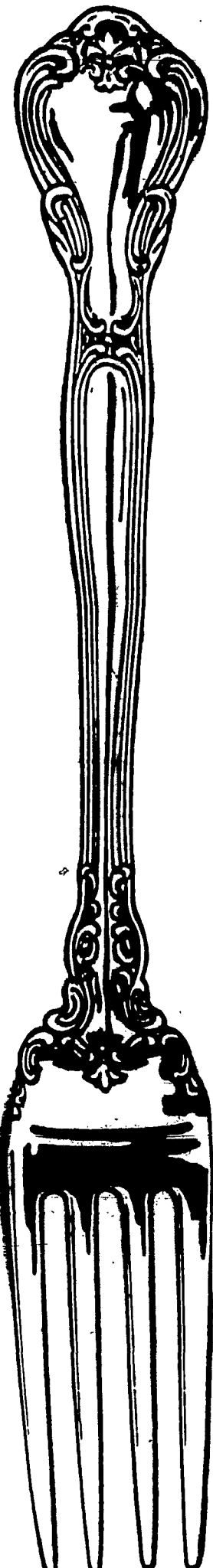

## JFK Election Hailed By Jews

New York — (RNS) — Election of a Roman Catholic President was cited as a notable break-through in human relations before the 54th annual meeting of the American Jewish Committee.

Dr. John Slawson, the committee's executive vice-president, said the election of John F. Kennedy "has both symbolized and ratified America's entry into a pluralistic social order in practice and not alone in theory."

He added, "The election has helped to allay Catholic defensiveness and some Catholic feeling of second-class citizenship. It may put Catholics so much more at ease in America that they may become less self-segregating and less reluctant to participate in a pluralistic society."

"THE PROTESTANT," Dr. Slawson said, "is witnessing a pluralistic social order in practice and not alone in theory. Jews seem comfortable with the new Administration, because of the definite feeling that one gets that ability takes precedence over irrelevancies."

"We should, however, keep in mind two things: the emergence of reactionary groups as a protest to a liberal administration, such as the John Birch Society, and that pluralism calls for an increase in intergroup contacts and may result in intergroup conflicts over difference in perceptions and values."

In his discussion, he turned to the ecumenical movement in Christian Churches. "It is difficult to say at this time," said Dr. Slawson, "that the consequences for the Jewish position

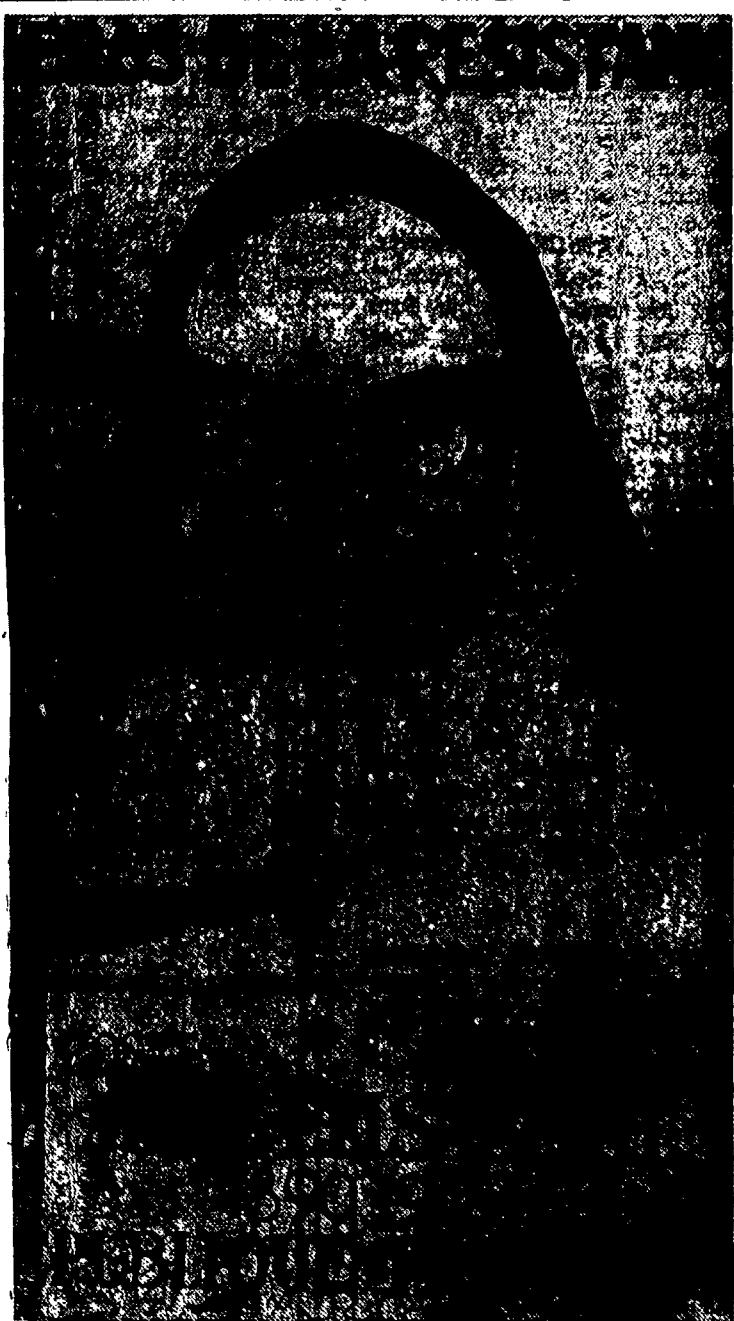
in the United States will be of the ecumenical movement—the movement for unity on the part of both the Catholic and Protestant groups.

"On the one hand, it is conceivable that the realization by Christendom that it is indeed a minority in the world scene today and becoming more so as Islam gains rapid inroads in Africa, and its concern with the threat from Communism, may cause this movement for unity to spill over into a relationship with the Jewish group of the nature of an ally."

"ON THE OTHER hand, the Jewish position on many matters such as censorship and Church-State are in direct conflict frequently with the positions of Catholics, sometimes tending to contribute toward divisiveness. Nevertheless, I think it is becoming a fact that the problem of Christian-Jewish relationships has been brought prominently before the American public, as can be discerned by the re-examination of intergroup relations factors in Christian education — even a concern with the degree to which the New Testament is a source of anti-Semitism and the search for antidotes to the prejudice-producing material in religious education."

She is featured along with three other heroes of the French wartime resistance in a new series of postage stamps issued in France. Mother Elizabeth was arrested by the Gestapo in Lyons in 1944 for her resistance activities and was deported to the Ravensbruck camp in Germany. A year later, she was executed in a gas chamber. 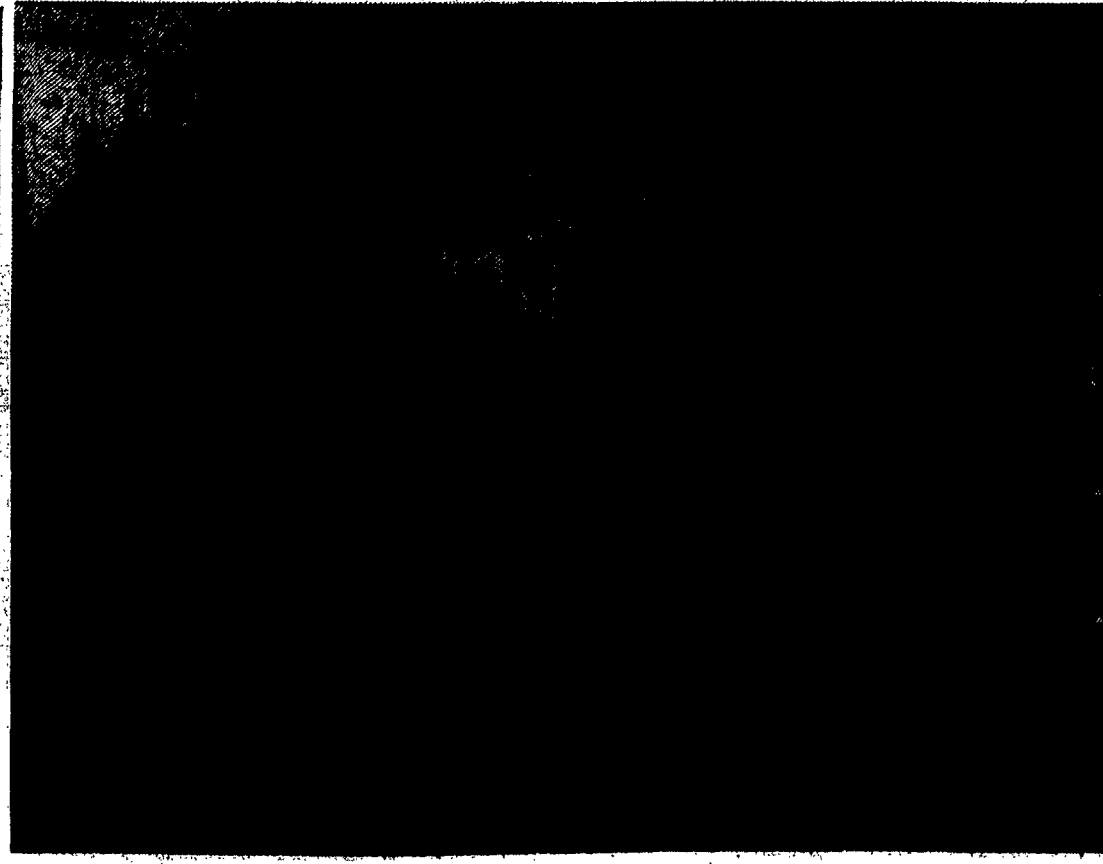

## Canada Differs In School Aid

Americans are debating the question of Federal assistance for private and parochial schools as part of massive U.S. help to education. The following article is the third of a series describing how religious schools fare in Canada.

Ottawa, Ont. — (NC) — British Columbia and Manitoba are exceptions to the rule of tax aid for religious and private schools found in the eight other Canadian provinces.

In both provinces, where Catholics are in the minority, and futile campaign to win supporters of private schools are in the same boat as parents of private and parochial pupils in the United States.

They pay taxes for public schools and also support by donations the schools they choose for their children.

IT WAS ONLY recently that private schools in both provinces were released from the additional burden of paying taxes on their property.

Government assistance was not always denied religious schools in Manitoba. In 1871 the Manitoba School Act established a dual — Catholic and Protestant — system aided by taxes.

At the time, the province's population was almost evenly divided between French-speaking Catholics and English-speaking Protestants.

In succeeding years, the balance of population shifted toward the Protestants. As this trend continued, criticism of the dual system increased.

In 1890, a Liberal government abolished the use of French as the official language and ended the dual educational system with its tax support.

ENGLISH BECAME the official language. A provincial Department of Education was established and it launched a government-controlled school system.

## India Unit Protests Reds On Border

New Delhi — (RNS) — The Catholic Union of India condemned here the continued occupation by Communist China of 12,000 miles of border territory claimed by India. The same issue caused a rift in a concurrent meeting of the Communist-sponsored World Peace Council which held its annual session in New Delhi.

In its annual convention, the Catholic Union also took note that India must regard attempts being made by China to isolate the Indian subcontinent through successful negotiations with Burma and Nepal.

THE INDIA-CHINA border dispute proved an explosive issue at the World Peace Council sessions with Chinese Communist delegates walking out in protest to Indian demands to know what the Council proposed to do and say about the question.

Many ex-Communists, some members of the Indian National Association of Marxists, also demonstrated in protest over the border dispute when the Council met.

Chinese control of Tibet was raised at a Council function by India's Minister for Cultural Affairs and Scientific Research, Dr. Humayan Kabir. The occasion was a 100th birthday anniversary of the late Indian poet Tagore.

Dr. Kabir said that just as the poet's love for Japan did not prevent him from criticizing the Japanese invasion of Manchuria, he also would have condemned the suppression of Tibet by China.

## Liturgists Choose Scripture Theme

Purchase — (NC) — "Bible, Life, and Worship" will be the theme of the 1961 North American Liturgical Week to be held August 21 to 24 in Oklahoma City.

Father Frederick A. McManus, president of the national Liturgical Conference which sponsors the annual meeting, said the theme is "particularly important in these days, when the Holy Scriptures are at last attaining their rightful position in the spiritual formation of Christians."

ANNOUNCEMENT of the theme and other developments relating to the Liturgical Week was made after a meeting of the board of directors of the Liturgical Conference, held at Manhattanville College of the Sacred Heart.

It was announced that study groups will be included in the Liturgical Week program to consider the relation of liturgy to such special aspects of the Church's mission as teaching, lay organizations and religious communities.

Father McManus, a professor of canon law at the Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C., said there will be opportunities for those attending to discuss congregational participation in the Mass.
