Mission Day To Bring Maryknoll Missionary

St. Agnes High School students will participate in a morning dialogue Mass offered by a guest Maryknoll missionary on Mission Day, May 25.

Rev. Stephen Foody, M.M., will celebrate Mass in the school auditorium and speak to the student body on the Missions.

Born in New York City, Father Foody was assigned to a new mission in Puno, Peru, following his ordination in 1943. After three years there, he was reassigned to the Talca-Temuco Territory in Chile for the next ten years.

In March, 1958, he returned to the United States and was assigned to promotion and vocation work in Philadelphia, New York, and Boston. Last June he was appointed as Superior to the Buffalo Promotion House to carry on this promotion and vocation work in Rochester, Buffalo, Ogdensburg, and Erie, Pennsylvania.

FATHER'S MASS and sermon will set the keynote for the day's purpose — aiding the Missions in South America. For the rest of the day, and on into the evening, the St. Agnes students will welcome parents and visitors to their variety, game, and refreshment booths set up around the school.

Most of the day's proceeds will go to Maryknoll to aid its mission work in Latin America. The public is invited from 3 p.m. to 9 p.m.

Columbian Squires Hear Civil War Talk

Corning — Insights into the physical and mental effects on young soldiers engaged in battle in the Civil War were presented Sunday evening to the Circle of Columbian Squires by Robert Leavy Jr., of Corning.

Leavy described for the members of the group the type of soldier engaged in combat for both the southern and northern armies, their ages, occupations, hometowns, and thoughts, before and after the war.

HE DISPLAYED a number of Civil War guns and explained their uses and capabilities. He listed the units from the Corning and Elmira area involved in battles and told of losses sustained in each.

His talk was arranged by the Civic Culture committee of the Squires whose chairmen are Joseph Welch and Richard Keck Jr. William Russell, Counselor of the committee from the Knights of Columbus, introduced the speaker. The meeting was held in the K. of C. Home on Cedar St. and conducted by Lawrence Riesbeck, Chief Squire.

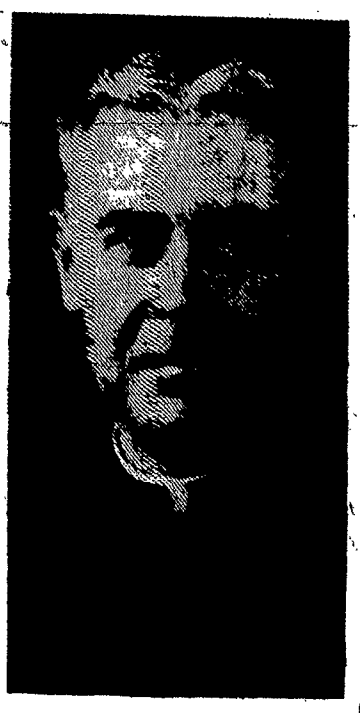
He announced that next Sunday the Circle will join the Elmira group there for a bowling meet. The joint session has been arranged by the Physical committee of which James Johnston is Counselor.

Legion Of Mary Charts Growth

Santiago — (NC) — The Legion of Mary in Chile has recruited more than 3,000 active members and 30,000 auxiliary members in the four years since its foundation.

This is reported by the central office of the Legion here. Since each active member pledges to devote at least two hours weekly to the legion work, the legion gives at least 6,000 man-hours of work for the Church every week.

SO RAPID is the growth and so widespread the apostolate it is impossible to get complete current statistics. In Santiago, for example, where the legion is already established in 56 parishes, 10 more parishes now are forming praesidia (individual units).

In the Vicariate of the Aracania under the direction of the Capuchin Fathers the first curia (group of praesidia) was established just a year ago. Now there are 3 curiae and 40 praesidia in the Vicariate. In the whole country there are 320 praesidia and 18 curiae.

The statistics for just 100 of these praesidia during six months of 1960 show that they were responsible for 175 conversions, the return of 247 persons to the sacraments, the righting of 332 marriages, and preparation of 1,086 children and 117 adults for first Com-

Diplomats At Vatican

Vatican City — (NC) — There are 44 diplomats accredited to the Holy See according to the new list issued by the Vatican Secretariat of State.

They include 33 ambassadors, nine ministers and two administrators of affairs. Thirty-five governments maintain embassies at the Holy See, but two—those of Panama and Bolivia—are temporarily without ambassadors.

There are nine ministers. Eleven governments have legations here, but those of Indonesia and Finland are without ministers for the time being.

THERE ARE also two administrators of affairs for Poland and for Lithuania. These diplomats were ambassadors to the Holy See for former non-communist governments of their countries, and continued in that status when the governments they represented fell. But they were not called upon to present their credentials to Pope John XXIII after his election in 1958.

Dean of the diplomatic corps is Ambassador Joseph Kripp of Austria, who presented his credentials in 1952. Oldest diplomat here in years of service, however, is Minister Filippo Serlupi Crescenzi of San Marino, who presented his credentials in 1939.

Embassies are maintained at the Holy See by Argentine, Austria, Belgium, Bolivia, Brazil, Chile, China (Nationalist), Colombia, Costa Rica, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, El Salvador, France, Germany, Guatemala, Haiti, Honduras, Iran, Ireland, Italy, Japan, Lebanon, Luxembourg, Netherlands, Panama, Paraguay, Peru, Philippines, Portugal, Spain, Turkey, United Arab Republic, Uruguay and Venezuela.

Jesuit Named To Aid Cubans

Boston — (RNS) — Father Robert F. Drinan, S.J., dean of the Boston College Law School was named to an 11-member American Bar Association committee to aid Cuban lawyers now in this country.

The committee will try to secure temporary employment in the United States for several hundred Cuban attorneys and judges who left Cuba in protest of, or were expelled by, the Castro regime.

Attorney Stephen P. Duggan, Jr., of New York, was named chairman of the committee. He is trustee of the Institute of International Education.

Legations are maintained by Ethiopia, Finland, Great Britain, India, Indonesia, Liberia, Monaco, Nicaragua, the Order of Malta, Pakistan and San Marino.
