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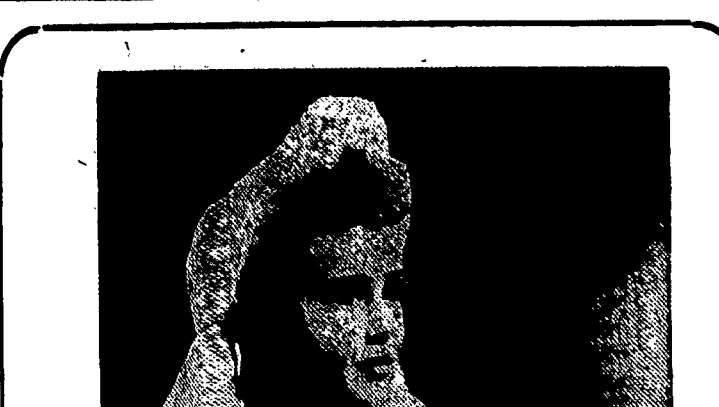

Tired Pastor, 34, Pepped Up By Curate, 72!

Inchon, Korea — A 34-year-old mission pastor here claims he has discovered the eighth wonder of the world his tireless, energetic, 72-year-old curate.

"LAST SUNDAY evening, after a full day of mission work, I was exhausted," reports Father Thomas McKee, M.M., of Tulsa, Okla., "until my white-haired curate, Father John Morris, stepped sprightly into the rectory and nonchalantly announced that he had celebrated and preached at three Masses, baptized 19 infants, heard over 100 confessions, and driven 20 miles in a Jeep over rugged country roads. "Instead of collapsing into a soft chair next to me, he told me to 'relax' while he popped over to the church to lead the parish Rosary and give Benediction. With him around, I think twice now before complaining of being tired."

THE WIRY Maryknoll septuagenarian is on his second tour of duty in the Korean missions. Ordained in 1914, Father Morris served several years in his hometown of Fall River, Mass. before joining Maryknoll. From 1923 to 1936 he worked in Korea. In 1937 he was transferred to Japan where he labored until World War II forced his return to the U.S. After various stateside posts, Father Morris asked for and received a reassignment to the missions of Korea in 1959 at the age of 70.
